A Disastrous Runaway.

A horse belonging to O. Davis, a contractor living at Thirty-seventh and Davenport streets, succeeded a panic on Farnam street at 1:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The animal broke its tie strap at the court house and made a wild dash down Farnam street. A collision with a telegraph post in front of the Bee office relieved the animal of the buggy, to which it was attached. The horse then took the sidewalk down past the New York life building to the alarm and danger of pedestrians. At the east side of the entrance the horse collided with the large post that supported the area railing and broke it off at the sidewalk. The animal leapt on its hind legs and crashing Sixteenth street it crashed into a show case filled with candy, the stock in trade of a corner fruit vendor. The horse smashed into countless pieces and its contents scattered over the sidewalk. The collision threw the horse to the ground and after a further short run it was captured by Officer Eyerly and returned to its owner.

WILL RUN SOLID INTO OMAHA.

The Milwaukee Passenger Trains to Arrive on New Year's Day.

The Milwaukee will commence running its passenger trains into Omaha January 1. This is in accordance with an agreement entered into between the Union Pacific and the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul companies nearly a year ago. The date for the operation of the agreement was fixed several times, but a postponement was occasioned by one reason or another.

It has now been definitely arranged, however, that the Milwaukee trains will run solid from Chicago to the union depot in this city commencing January 1. The arrangement will prove of great benefit to the Milwaukee and to Omaha.

Milwaukee Appointments.

The following appointments and changes on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul have been made taking effect January 1: G. F. White, division freight and passenger agent, Davenport, Ia.; Dubuque division and branch, from Clinton to La Crescent inclusive; the Chicago & Council Bluffs division, from Davenport to Jackson Junction, including the Maquoketa branch and the line from Farley to, but not including Parlati; also Rock Island and Moline, Ill.; B. H. McLean, division freight and passenger agent, Cedar Rapids, Ia. Chicago & Council Bluffs division from Elk River Junction to Council Bluffs, not inclusive, and from Marion to Cedar Rapids, inclusive; J. T. Conley, division freight and passenger agent, Winona, Minn.; river division agent, including St. Paul and Minneapolis; Wabasha, Chippewa Valley and Southern Minnesota divisions; W. E. Peak, division freight and passenger agent, Mason City, Ia.; Iowa and Dakota division and including Austin, E. W. Jordan, division freight and passenger agent, Sioux City, Ia. Sioux City and Dakota division.

The Switchmen's Troubles.

The reported general disaffection among the western switchmen is not generally credited by Union Pacific officials, although that company has been having considerable trouble with men at various western points. At Ogden, Poocatello and Rock Springs the places of the striking switchmen have been filled by new men and the business of the company is being handled as usual without any delay. The switchmen at Rawlins went out but their places were filled promptly without any inconvenience to the company. There is no open disaffection locally or at other points along the line, but there may be trouble if the switchmen insist upon a demand for a radical advance in their scale of wages as they have threatened to do.

The Hog Rate Adjusted.

The rate on live hogs, Missouri river to Chicago, is reduced from 35 to 22 cents, while the rate on packing house products is advanced from 18 to 22 cents. The tariff on these articles from the Missouri to the Mississippi river will be 15 cents. It is also announced that on packing house product going to the seaboard a rate of 18 cents from the Missouri to the Mississippi river will be applied.
