ANIMUS OF ATTACKS ON GENERAL RAUM.

WASHINGTON BUREAU (THE BEE), 315 F STREET, WASHINGTON, D. C., June 7. It is hard to imagine, in the light of developments during the past few days, what the democrats will next circulate in order to make a sensational issue. The one that has been made upon Pension Commissioner Raum has been shown to be for the purpose of making converts to the anti-pension issue which is being pushed by democrats and wumpuses everywhere with the ultimate purpose of not only breaking the force of Mr. Cleveland's anti-pension policy, but of establishing a system of direct taxation with which to meet pension payments. The democrats have been introducing bills in congress looking toward this end for many years, and during the last congress a number of measures were by them offered directly proposing that pensions shall hereafter be paid by direct taxation. They believe that if property owners have to meet \$100, 500,000 or more every year by direct taxes they will rise up and demand the repeal of the pension laws. The present manner of meeting pensions is too easy and light. They must if possible be made to fall heavily upon the taxpayers. This thing of an increasing revenue is a serious matter. It is first begun when a useless veteran occupies the place, Corporal Tanner, and he is driven out. Then it is renewed as soon as another brave and honest veteran was appointed, General Raum. If he should retire it would be continued against his successor. It would make no difference who the man was, the war against the other would continue.

WITHOUT MORAL AUTHORITY.

Text of an Official Note Received by the Chilean Legation in Paris.

ANARCHISTS ATTEMPT A DEMONSTRATION.

Death of Colonel Lebel, Inventor of the Rifle of That Name—The Workmen's Pension Bill Well Received.

PARIS, June 7.—The Chilean legation has received an official note issued at Santiago by the so-called delegation of congress, representing the revolutionary army, without moral authority; that the insurgents of Tarapaca lack authority and have no means with which to make an expedition into the provinces of the government, 30,000 soldiers and 10,000 gendarmes, well equipped and disciplined, while the revolutionary army consists only of a few hundred men. The constitutional congress, the note adds, has approved economic laws, furnishing the government with ample resources.
