

FOREIGN FINANCIAL REVIEW.

Dealings Unusually Meagre Throughout the Leading European Money Centers.

BUSINESS AGAIN DISSAPPOINTED BULLS.

Paris Prices Slightly Advanced With Regular Current of Transactions—Frankfort Bourse Very Quiet.

LONDON, July 12.—There was rather more demand of discount during the past week at 1 1/2 per cent for three months and 1/2 per cent for short. The discount market has set in on the stock exchange. The markets are absolutely stagnant and although quotations move up and down, dealings are unusually meagre. The extreme cheapness of money assists in investments in stocks, but no spirit for business exists anywhere.

In foreign securities there were sharp fluctuations in Portugal during the week, the result of Friday's close being a rise of 1/4 per cent on the week. Spanish closed 1/2 per cent up. South American securities were flat; Brazilian raised 1/4 and Argentine 1/2 per cent. English railway securities showed a general upward tendency on improved traffic on American railways. The course of business again disappointed bulls. Every rose and again prices improved, only to relapse owing to lack of genuine public support. The week's variations in prices include the following:

Increases: Luke Shire, 1/2 per cent; Louisiana & Nashville, 1/4 per cent; North Pacific preferred, 1/2 per cent; Central Pacific, Union Pacific, and Wabash preferred, 1/2 per cent each. Decreases: Denver preferred, 1/2 per cent; Norfolk preferred, 1/2 per cent; Pennsylvania & Ohio and Ohio & Mississippi, 1/4 per cent each. There was some demand for Canadian securities. Grand Trunk firsts and second preferred advanced 1/2 per cent each. Third preferred and guaranteed 1/2 per cent each. Mexican railway was weak; second and third preferred, 1/2 per cent. Of the miscellaneous securities, Bell's Asbestos decreased 1/2 per cent on the week, and Hudson Bay 1/2 per cent.

Havana Trade Review.

HAVANA, July 12.—The sugar market was quiet during the past week. Holders were too high for buyers and in consequence a very small business was transacted.

Stock in warehouse at Havana, 1,200,000 bags, 3,200 hogsheads. Receipts for the week, 11,100 bags and 33 hogsheads. Exports, 50,000 bags, 300 hogsheads, of which 57,000 bags and 18 hogsheads were to the United States.

WAREHOUSE AND GRAIN LAWS

Elevators and Inspection Essential to the Making of a Market.

NEBRASKA'S LAW A VERY GOOD ONE.

Interviews with Grain Men of Other States Regarding the Operation of Their Warehouse and Inspection Laws.

Although the states of Illinois, Missouri and Minnesota long ago passed warehouse bills providing rules and regulations for the storage and inspection of grain, the action of the Nebraska legislature in the same direction has been the occasion of a great deal of comment, especially by the eastern press. As passed by the legislature there is nothing especially striking about the Nebraska law, which was copied after the laws already in existence in the older states, but under the wrong interpretation of certain papers it has been made to appear in the light of something new in legislation. It has been compared to the sub-treasury scheme and has been laid at the door of the farmer's alliance, when in reality the members of that organization were inclined to oppose it in the legislature. It has been further represented that the state would be open to farmers which will be negotiable in local boards of trade, and furthermore that such boards are springing up all over the state and that farmers are being deceived and misled by paying a small sum.

Some eastern papers have been giving large space to such nonsense, and it may be of interest to read the views of the Nebraska warehouse bill—facts which have already been published in these columns, but which are being repeated in a great mass of rubbish that has been published on the subject.

The Nebraska warehouse law was copied after the Illinois law with only a few essential changes, as it was thought that a law which had been in force in that state for many years would give such general satisfaction, would be equally successful in Nebraska. This refutes the claim that it is an experiment or something new in legislation.

The Nebraska warehouse law has for its object the improvement of the facilities for handling the grain within the state. In other words, it was designed with the view of transferring some of the grain business now done in eastern cities to Nebraska. Nebraska grain men were of the opinion that at least some of the grain grown in this state ought to be stored here and sold direct to the consumer instead of being all shipped to Chicago or St. Louis and sold there.

In order to do this it was necessary to have an inspection established by law which would give Nebraska grain a certain standing in the markets of the country.

It was also necessary to provide laws regulating warehouses which are as essential to a grain market as stock yards are to a live stock market. The law does not affect private elevators but only such as declare themselves public warehouses for the transportation of grain.

Any effort in that direction would be solely for the purpose of capturing a portion of the independent vote; but I do not think the party in power is so much as the independents have not with considerable success in recent elections and are, therefore, strongly impressed with the idea of the party in power.

The Nebraska legislature did well to copy after the Illinois state law which has proved so great success and given satisfaction to the grain men of that state. It is not only fair to the farmer, but it is also fair to the consumer, and it is also fair to the state.

The warehouse laws under which Minnesota grain is handled are very good. They are generally satisfactory to both the farmers and the grain buyers, though the latter two to some extent have been misled by some of the grain men of that state. The laws themselves are regarded just, but the enforcement of them has in some cases been so unfair as to create a deal of adverse comment. The investigation of what is known as "the Duluth incident," which was in progress a few months ago, has shown the progress of the legislature, grew out of the loss of the inspection department which was established in 1886. It was a great misfortune that the inspection department was not connected with the commission with the trouble. About 200,000 bushels of wheat had disappeared from the Duluth elevators in the last year. A great quantity of wheat was shipped out as screenings in 1886. A large quantity of wheat in that year was bin burnt, and the inspection department claims that it chose this method of getting rid of the grain rather than to publicly announce that the wheat was spoiled and create a panic in the grain markets. In some quarters it is claimed that when this grain reached Buffalo it was given a high grade and several months enriched by the inspectors. The Henderson grain buyer says his elevator have all been eaten up the past two seasons by prejudiced grading and heavy dockage. The fact is that the same thing is a combination among the elevators and inspectors to bear prices and undergrade grain.

The Missouri law has proven still more unsatisfactory. The grain commission men of Kansas City are not favorably impressed with the law in that state. They say that they cannot express themselves sufficiently to show their opposition to it. They claim to represent the sentiment of all large grain dealers in the state who are in favor of the law as adopted by Missouri is impracticable, unreasonable and unjust, is harmful to the interests of the farmers and the elevator men, and is a combination among the elevators and inspectors to bear prices and undergrade grain.

Mr. Davidson of the state of Wisconsin and Smith, says the Missouri law is, in the first place, too stringent. Elevator companies cannot live up to its provisions. It imposes a large additional expense upon them and requires such an explicit and minute report as to be impossible to comply with. The law is unjust, because it makes no provision for the inspection of elevators with a capacity of 50,000 bushels and over, while elevators with a capacity of less than that are inspected and carry on a business that, under the law, would be a crime if done by the large companies. The most objectionable feature of the law is that it requires the mixing of grain, a system which it prohibits altogether in the regular elevators, or those with a capacity of 50,000 bushels or over, or which want to do a general warehouse business in handling grain for the farmers and issue receipts. Without mixing grain it is simply impossible to handle it as the only thing a firm can do in handling everybody's grain, of as many different grades as there are sellers, is to mix it and make up a uniform grade to supply the demand. Now the injustice of the law comes in here where an elevator with a capacity of 50,000 bushels or over, is required to mix the grain, while a larger elevator must comply with the law in regard to mixing reports, etc., and handle simply as a private company and business men who are not interested in the law get no benefit from the law. The law, it is believed, hurts the farmer to the extent of 8 to 10 cents per bushel. To become a regular elevator under the law a firm with a capacity of 50,000 bushels or over is compelled to give a heavy bond. Before the new law went into effect the Union elevator, of which Mr. Davidson is a member, could handle any one's grain and issue receipts for it, but now the company is

Thomas Best, a large exporter, says the export business from Missouri has been killed, as the law prevents shippers from making a uniform grade from the multiplicity of grades received, consequently not sufficient to meet the demand of the market.
