

ON THE BRIDGE AT MIDNIGHT.

The Union Pacific Embargo Raised by a Milwaukee Freight Train.

PASSENGERS NOW CROSSING THE RIVER.

Welcoming the First Through Train—Rock Island Plans—Union Depot Matters—Justice Brewer's Decree in Full.

At last, a new era in western railroad affairs dawned yesterday morning when the first solid passenger train left the union depot by way of the Milwaukee line for Chicago and the east.

It was drawn out controversy over the right to use the Union Pacific bridge was ended, and a happy feeling pervaded the circles of railroad officials from heads of departments down to yardmasters.

The sword of Damocles which had hung suspended over the heads of three great railway systems, had, by virtue of a decree entered by Justice Brewer, been thrown away and the bloodless battle was terminated by the circuit court ordering the defendant company to proceed to comply with the contract entered into by the Union Pacific and the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul on the one hand and the Union Pacific on the other.

The Milwaukee having been granted the exclusive right to use the bridge on the north side of the depot, at midnight freight trains commenced crossing the bridge and it has been the commonest occurrence in the world.

At 9:30 yesterday morning passenger train No. 1, east bound, left the depot on this side of the river and put the Milwaukee line on the tracks at the transfer, Council Bluffs, without even so much as a ripple of excitement. Victors and vanquished were equally satisfied that the only thing to be done was to obey the mandate of the court, and per consequence they went about it in the most methodical and unobtrusive manner.
