Quality of Some Analyzed for the Board of Health's Delectation.

DOCTORS WHO DON'T RESPECT RULES.

Checks Which the Authorities Will Put Upon the Medicines—The Natatorium's Pool and the High School's Air.

The Board of Health met yesterday at 10:30 o'clock with Health Commissioner Gapsen, Mayor Cushing, Chief Seavey, sanitary Commissioner Andrea and Councilman Blumer present.

The following list of expenditures for the year 1901 up to September 15 was presented:

Salaries... \$1,122.86 Medicines and drugs... 129.81 Fuel... 129.81

Dr. Gapsen said that there was an objection to sending in the cause of death on a post-mortem card, and thought that better and more accurate results could be obtained from a blank enclosed in an envelope.

The physician was instructed to make complete reports of all deaths resulting under their charge, and to mail such report promptly to the board of health.

Dr. Gapsen reported that numerous complaints had been made concerning the water used at the natatorium, but that they had generally been in the nature of a nuisance.

At the time of taking samples the water was very thoroughly stirred up by about twenty-five bathers. The water was decidedly turbid and in it were seen many small pieces of human hair and pieces of skin.
