INTRENCHED MONOPOLY.

The number of trusts and combinations defined by the anti-trust law is said to exceed 150, with a capitalization amounting to several hundred millions of dollars.

These "immense aggregations of kindred enterprises and combinations of business interests," as President Cleveland expressed it in his inaugural address, "formed for the purpose of limiting production and fixing prices."

It is not difficult to understand that the Department of Justice may view this task as a very formidable one, to be entered upon with the greatest care.

PROGRESS OF THE ARBITRATION. The speech of Mr. James C. Carter, as counsel for the United States before the Bering sea tribunal of arbitration, which was finished Tuesday, has given its author international fame.

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FEAR ANTI-CHINESE RIOTS

Enforcement of the Geary Law Expected to Cause Trouble. PREPARING TO PREVENT BLOODSHED. Federal Government Notified by the Chinese Empire that it Will Be Held Responsible for the Injury Done Subjects of that Country.

The Chinese government, through the consul of Legation, has served notice on the State department that any bloodshed or loss of life resulting from anti-Chinese riots Friday when the Geary law goes into effect, the Chinese empire will hold the federal government responsible.
