

RUIN WROUGHT BY THE RAIN

Went Storm in Years Does Great Damage to Property.
LOW DISTRICTS COMPLETELY SUBMERGED
Boats Required to Save the Lives and Property of Citizens on North Twenty-fourth Street—Motor Tracks Flooded by Floating Debris—The Rainfall.

It is impossible to tell what daylight will reveal when it breaks upon Omaha this summer Sunday morning, but it can not fall to show in many quarters a scene of desolation wrought by last night's flood.

Never before was this city visited by such a downpour. It was not a cloudburst, attended by a phenomenal fall of water for a few minutes, but it was a continuous pouring that showed no signs of abatement for over three hours.

The successive showers of the afternoon came in clear intervals on an April day. It was followed by bright sunshine about 6 o'clock, and it was supposed that the fall was over, but about 6 o'clock a black bank of clouds sprang up in the west and rose rapidly toward the zenith.

It was scarcely any time at all until the gutters were rushing torrents, and inside of ten minutes the gutters utterly failed to provide a passageway for the water, and the streets were flooded from curb to curb.

The streets were deserted by humanity, save the hackmen, who busily plied their calling and earned dollars by the hundred. Even those who patronized them, however, were not to be seen in the streets.

It was not until the storm had spent itself that it was possible to make any thing like a satisfactory examination to note the ruin wrought by the rain.

One of the first places reported as inundated was Patrick avenue, where the water was rushing down the draw from the vicinity of Twenty-fourth street.
