Points Parsed and Questions Decided by the Judges Saturday.

LINCOLN, July 2.—[Special to THE BEE.]—In the supreme court yesterday the following decisions were given out:

Clarke Banking company vs Wright. Error from Douglas county. Reversed, and remanded. Opinion by Mr. Chief Justice Maxwell.

An affidavit for the issuance of an attachment may be made by leave of the court, even after a motion to quash the proceedings is filed, because of that particular defect.

Eden Munes company vs Yohes. Error from Douglas county. Reversed and remanded with instructions to dismiss at costs of appellant. Opinion by Mr. Justice Norva.

A party appealing from a judgment of a justice of the peace to the district court may discontinue his appeal without the consent of the appellee at any time before the case is admitted to the court for jury.

Wymore and Missouri Valley Railroad company, 23 Nebraska 620, and Robbins vs Omaha, 23 Nebraska 713, distinguished.
