

LICENSE BOARD OVERRULED

Action in a Certain Case Quickly Reversed by the District Court.

JUDGE SCOTT DECIDES A SALOON CASE

Property Owners Win in Their Protest Against a Saloon at Fifteenth and Farnam—Verdict Against a Policeman—Minor Court Matters.

The hearing of the arguments in the appeal from the decision of the members of the fire and police commission in the Peter Kaiser liquor case consumed the greater portion of the time in the criminal court yesterday.

In the early part of the year Kaiser applied for a license authorizing him to operate a saloon in the basement of the Barker block, at the corner of Fifteenth and Farnam streets.

Frank Hanson, who appeared for the protestants, said that there was nothing proper against the location of a saloon upon the particular corner and that it would injure the trade of the surrounding business houses.

Alleged Breach of Contract. Edward W. Waterman has sued Dennis A. Harrington for the sum of \$111, alleging the breach of contract in the erection of a dwelling.

The plaintiff alleges that he has suffered damages for the simple reason that his house was not erected exactly like that of O'Donnell's.

Verdict Against a Policeman. In the case of Charles M. Bachmann against Policeman Brady and his bondsmen, where suit was brought to recover alleged damages of \$1,000 by reason of an arrest, the officer thinking that the plaintiff looked like a man who had stolen a watch from a Fifth Street auction shop, the jury in Judge Hitt's court yesterday returned a verdict assessing \$50 as the amount of damage which Bachmann had sustained.

Burglars Found Guilty. After being on trial the jury in the case of the state against J. C. Jackson and Charles Austin yesterday returned a verdict finding the defendants guilty. They were charged with having burglarized a residence, stealing a gold watch and a lot of clothing.
