The friends of Tom Brooks are meeting with more trouble than they had looked for in getting him out from behind the bars of the state penitentiary. It was announced several weeks ago that he would probably be released in a very few days, but time has dragged along without seeming to reward their efforts with any very substantial success.

The lower house does not seem to be very much in favor of pardoning criminals this year, for he has already refused to grant pardons to three men who are serving life sentences. Iowa's Senate Will Then Settle the Fate of Modification for this Time.

PROHIBITION IS AHEAD UP TO DATE

Liberal Republicans Have Been Playing Into the Radical's Hand by Trying to Legislate on Early Trials - The Situation in Brief.

DES MOINES, March 18.—(Special to The Bee)—Tuesday will determine if there is to be any modification of the prohibitory law. Waterman's motion to reconsider the vote by which the Carpenter bill was killed in the senate will come up as a special order and the outcome of the debate will depend on the fate of modification.

NORTHWESTERN NOTES. The Anconada mines at Butte have closed, throwing out 400 men.

The option on the Mercury mine at Camp Floyd, Utah, for \$750,000, held by Denver parties, has been extended until April.

Allerton, the new town in the Cochise district, is booming. A telephone line and toll road are being laid forward. A water system will be put in at once.

A New Mexico paper says: "Geronimo, the Apache Indian chief, is now a justice of the peace and is probably taking as much pleasure in skinning litigants with his fee bill as he used to in scalping his adversaries with his knife."

The Wichita register estimates that in the territory of about thirty-six miles square, with Wilbur in the center, 1,680,000 bushels of grain was produced last season, twenty-five per cent more than in any previous year.

Within ten miles of Waterville 500 acres are planted to fruit trees, and on the Upper Columbia, in Douglas county, near central Ferry, Bridgeport and Beatty, are some of the largest and finest peach orchards in the state of Washington.

At one place on the Idaho side of the Snake river, across the county, and not covering a space of over fifty feet in extent, eight head of dead cattle were recently counted. They met death by tumbling from the bluff above.

Artesian water has been struck in Cochise county, Arizona, by a man named McEae. The flow is 21,000 gallons in twenty-four hours. In addition to the water, McEae said he got \$2,000 reward offered by the supervisors for a running well not more than 500 feet deep.

A fine marble quarry has been discovered in Arizona near the mouth of Verde river, some thirty miles from Phoenix. The ledge is well defined, about fifteen feet in width and lies between the Verde and the Verde said to be excellent, with a fine grain, taking a high polish.

In order to get cattle from Sierra valley to Downsville, Sierra City, a distance of twenty-five miles, they were driven by Reno and from there shipped by rail to Colfax and driven to their destination. The distance is thirty miles and the time consumed is five days.

The run of grass cattle to market from Texas will be about 40 per cent less this year than last. The cause has been fed this year than last in Texas, and it would have been had it not been for last season's drought. The fed cattle will all be shipped out by April 1.

Montana is yet without a state flower, and a lady writing to the Helena Independent suggests the wild tulip or the cactus. The former is the flower of the state, while the latter, in other directions, does not appear to have a large number of native flowers from which to make a selection.

Two chained racoons in an Oklahe (Cal) menagerie became very tame. The boys and the chain that held one broke. The animal began immediately on the other inmates of the cage and in a short time had killed several fowls. It was a wild dog that ate its still chained companion a pet cow.

The Port Blakely mill has a record of producing 400,000 feet of lumber in ten hours. Over the mill it is believed that it beats the world of mills. The mill is 800 feet long. The company has two hand mills in operation, and intends to eventually replace every circular and gang saw running with bands.

The Salt Lake Tribune is urging the business men of that city to be looking toward Los Angeles for a water connection with tide water, even as Colorado is looking toward Galveston and New Orleans. A south-west line to southern Colorado would be of great advantage both to Utah and Colorado.

The outlook for cattle in Arizona this year is propitious. The copious rainfalls of last summer placed the range in better condition than for years before. There is an abundance of grass in the fertile valleys and mesas of northern and southern Arizona and cattle are sleek and fat. Reports are made to assure an abundance of early spring feed.

RELIGIOUS. Dr. Talmage has again withdrawn his resignation as pastor of the Brooklyn tabernacle.

Rev. A. Routh of Piney Plains, Va., has been the father of twenty children, eighteen of whom are living. He is 75, bald and hearty, and able to ride circuit and preach every Sunday.

Rev. Thomas T. Stone, D.D., who is now residing in Middlesex county, Massachusetts, recently completed his 93rd year. He is the oldest living graduate of Bowdoin college, Maine, and has served seventy years in the ministry.

There are 237 Baptist churches in New Jersey, divided into 14 synods, 354 ordained ministers, 94 licentiates, 202 pastors, and 42,507 church members. During the last year there were raised \$427,606.50, of which \$337,637.48 were for current expenses.

Incomplete returns from conferences of the Methodist Protestant church indicate a mission work of 127,491. The total for 1913 last year. These reports are for fifty-three conferences. There are in all forty-three conferences, many of those not reporting are very small.

Frank H. Wright, a full-blooded Indian, has been conducting a series of revival meetings in Pasadena, Cal. One of the converts is that thirteen young men and women said to be prominent socially, have signed a pledge to give up dancing, card-playing and theater-going for the rest of their lives.

During the year 1893 the Congregational Church Building society paid out \$126,622 to aid in building 144 different church buildings, besides \$20,108 for the erection of 127 schools. The principal gifts for church building were made to Illinois, \$13,150; Michigan, \$7,767; Kansas, \$7,448; Iowa, \$4,475; New York, \$17,448; Wisconsin, \$2,040.

The number of Lutheran ministers in the world, according to Rev. J. N. Lenker's new book, "Lutheranism in All Lands," is 42,346, with 4,277 churches and 53,000 baptized members. Of the churches, 9,727 are credited to America, 22,500 to Germany, 1,814 to Sweden, 1,000 to Norway, 1,300 to Denmark. The total of parochial schools is 94,017, of which 81,000 are in Germany.

There are eleven evangelical societies engaged in mission work in Mexico. The total number of foreign missionary laborers is 462 and of native assistants, 512. There are 463 congregations, 385 of which are organized churches, and 118 church buildings. There are 16,250 communicants, and about 50,000 adherents. There are seven training and theological schools, with eighty-eight students. The number of boarding schools and orphanages is twenty-three, with 715 pupils. There are 164 day schools, with 6,533 pupils. There are nearly 100 Sunday schools. There are eleven evangelists' papers published.

ARKANSAS PEOPLE OPEN THEIR ARMS TO RECEIVE THE NEW LINE.

DES MOINES, March 18.—(Special Telegram to The Bee.)—Colonel L. M. Martin, general manager of the Des Moines, Northern & Western, and also vice president of the Lake Superior, Southern & Gulf, the new line of railway which it is proposed to build between the lakes and the Gulf of Mexico, returned this morning from an extended business trip through Missouri and Arkansas in the interest of the big enterprise.

During his absence Colonel Martin spent two weeks at Little Rock in conference with the leading business men of the Arkansas city and others along the proposed line as now finally surveyed. Colonel Martin made arrangements for terminal facilities at Little Rock and awarded the contract for building 300 miles of the road from Little Rock to a point near Springfield, Mo., to the Interstate Construction company, which J. E. Rosenfeld, who built the Denver, Texas & Fort Worth road, is president.

The people of Little Rock and farmers along the route are highly pleased at the prospect of having a line of road built through the section of territory traversed, as the latter are now compelled to haul their produce to the river and then to a point of thirty miles to the nearest shipping point. Colonel Martin states that the work of construction will begin as soon as the construction company can get ready to begin operations. It is expected the road will be ready for equipment and operation before October.

PREACHERS DENOUNCE THE A. P. A. Sioux City Protestant Ministers Appeal to Their Patrons to Desert the Order.

SIoux CITY, March 18.—(Special Telegram to The Bee.)—Great excitement has been created here by an attack made by several leading Protestant ministers, headed by Rev. Max Bartling of the First Congregational church, upon the American Protective association, which has 2,000 votes in the city and holds the balance of power in the city elections. The ministers denounce the organization as unholly, anti-American and a political organization, and are urging the members of their congregations to desert it.

Sued by an Indignant Father. CRESTON, Ia., March 18.—(Special to The Bee.)—The town of Arion is considerably stirred up over a sensational suit which has lately developed in the normal college at that point. Burdett Briggs, a student at the college, has been engaged in the commercial department, where they use a substitute for money. The professor evidently changed his mind, as the warrant was not served and the case dismissed. The boy's father, however, is very indignant over the matter and has brought suit against Prof. Kellogg for \$5,000 damages, the case to come up at the March term of the district court.

QUESTIONS CATHOLICS' METHODS. Rev. Madison Peters of New York Denounces the Roman Church.

NEW YORK, March 18.—The sermon tonight of Rev. Madison C. Peters at the Bloomingdale Reformed church was devoted to an attack on the Roman Catholic church, particularly its influence in the government at Washington. The preacher had letters stating that nuns are permitted to go through all the departments on begging missions, and even to stand when the clerks receive their pay and solicit contributions, and that the Catholic influences are patent in all the departments in matters of appointment, promotion and advancement. In many instances were cited in which Protestants were discriminated against in favor of Catholics.

The speaker said: "The departments are full of just such cases, and an investigation will bring to light many of the ways that are dark and tricks that are not in vain to which the Roman church is resorted to find positions for true Catholics. The Mormons and the Romanists are the only religions that have ever maintained bureaus at Washington for lobbying in the interest of their churches.
