WASHINGTON, May 2.—Representative Reilly of Pennsylvania has introduced in the house a bill prepared by the counsel for the committee undertaking a reorganization of the affairs of the Union Pacific railway company.

Whereas there is a default in respect of any obligation or condition for which any lien now exists in favor of the government upon the property of the company, the attorney general is authorized to enforce the claim and foreclose the lien by sale or otherwise, by proceedings in the court of appeals in the District of Columbia.
