Result of the Republican Caucuses Held in the City Last Night.

CONSIDERABLE PLEDGING WAS DONE

One week from today the Douglas county republican convention will be held to nominate candidates for county offices and a legislative ticket. The primaries to elect delegates to this convention will be held next Friday and caucuses were held last evening for the nomination of delegates.

Republican caucuses commenced to show up their lightning rods as soon as the state convention was over and consequently they have gained several laps over their democratic brethren.
