"Connection will be made about Tuesday, if all goes well," said he, "with the Northern Pacific at Huntley, five miles of track

SERIOUS RIOTING AT RIO

Coming of Spring in Brazil Sets Trouble Break Cut Anew.

OVER THREE HUNDRED PERSONS KILLED

Admiral da Gama's Description of the Soldier-Patrolled City—Two Hundred Arrests—Troops Held in Barracks—Troops Aimed.

RIO DE JANEIRO, Sept. 28.—One hundred and ninety-seven persons have been arrested for being implicated in the riots of the last four days. The police and marines are active. Troops were held in barracks and soldiers with their rifles ready to issue.

MONTEVIDEO, Sept. 28.—Admiral da Gama asserts there has been rioting in Rio de Janeiro, lasting five days, accompanied by outrages on Portuguese merchants instigated directly by President Peleto, who incited the riotous mobs to destroy the property of foreign residents who are afraid to remain on the streets.

Order for a One-Language Ritual Satisfactory to Milwaukee Pythians

MILWAUKEE, Sept. 28.—Since the recent mass meeting of members of Knights of Pythias held in this city in which action was taken upon the matter of the German ritual, the various German lodges in this state have held separate meetings and have endorsed the action of the grand council.

The German members deplore the circulation broadcast of its report that they at any time contemplated withdrawing from the order. The only thing they did was to denounce the language used by Supreme Chancellor Blackwell, and the idea of seceding was never considered.

Rabbi Isaac Schwarz Dead.

NEWARK, N. Y., Sept. 28.—Isaac Schwarz, the oldest Jewish clergyman in New York, is dead, aged 77 years. He came to America in 1851 and to Newark in 1852. A widow and seven children survive him. He was the first pastor of the Temple B'nai B'Surim.

VALUABLE BRIDGE BURNED.

ILLINOIS CENTRAL Traffic Interrupted by Incendiarism at Iowa Falls.

MILWAUKEE, Sept. 28.—A special to the Journal from Iowa Falls, Ia., says: The 600-foot Illinois Central railroad bridge across the Iowa river at this point burned about 3 o'clock this morning. The fire was discovered by the night operator a few minutes after the eastbound passenger train passed over it. The bridge was built in 1885, and was seventy-five feet high. The origin of the fire is thought to be incendiary.

General Superintendent Sullivan of the Illinois Central said the freight traffic of the road would not be interrupted at all, as arrangements have been made to detour the Illinois Central trains around the gap. The bridge will be reconstructed within three days.

Court Notes.
