John Diamond Dies at His Home from the Effects of Poison.

HE SOUGHT RELIEF FROM HIS PAIN

Home Life Happy and No Reason Known Why He Should Commit Suicide—Worked Saturday at His Trade as a Blacksmith.

John Diamond, aged 48 years, residing at 1134 North Seventeenth street, died yesterday morning at 5:30 from an overdose of morphine.

Mr. Diamond, who came to this city about four years ago, has been employed at the Union Pacific shops as a blacksmith.

After taking the morphine Mr. Diamond lay down by the stove in the sitting room, and no particular attention was paid to him at the time, as it was not known by the family that he had taken the morphine.

Toward morning the labored breathing of Mr. Diamond attracted the attention of his wife and daughter, and after a while Dr. Carriker was summoned, but when he arrived Mr. Diamond was dead.

The friends of the family claim that no reason for committing suicide could be assigned, as the family circle always seemed to be a happy one and Mr. Diamond's family relations always seemed to be of the most pleasant.

The deceased moved to this city about four years ago from Boston, Mass. He leaves a wife and seven children. Mrs. Diamond being seriously ill at the present time. Mr. Diamond was a member of the Modern Woodmen of America and carried \$2,000 insurance in the order.

Coroner Maul was notified of the death yesterday morning and an inquest will be held this afternoon.
