

DISAGREE AS TO INSPECTORS

Members of the Board of Health in a Stubborn Quarrel.

FACTIONS ABOUT EVENLY MATCHED

Duncan and the Two Councilmen Want Old Inspectors Reemployed—Major Resolves to Call a Special Meeting of the Board—The Latest State.

The controversy between the Board of Health and the city council seems to be subject to an armistice for the present and the members of the board are improving their opportunity by indulging in a private row of their own.

The situation is in brief that the plumbing inspector and the councilmen want to reappoint the same inspectors who were removed some time ago. This idea is not favored by Mayor Bemis as he prefers to have men who are not involved in the political struggle and he also believes that the appointment of new men would go a long distance toward divorcing the board from politics.

But now that the slate has been agreed on and there are the necessary votes to elect, some difficulty is being encountered in obtaining a quorum of the board. The regular meeting was scheduled for Wednesday, but on account of the absence of most of the city officials, who were engaged in preparing the manipulation of the charter in Lincoln, it had to be postponed.

Commissioner Saville is occupying a neutral position and may concede to the demands for the reappointment of the three inspectors. He says that if they go back it will be with the understanding that they will not earn their salaries and not to pull political strings and also that they are responsible to him and not to the plumbing inspector.

SAFE PLAN OF MAYOR BEMIS.

Holds that the City Can Be Cleaned Through the Aid of Inspectors.

An order will probably be issued to the police department soon which is expected to spike the guns of the Board of Health. The fact that it is time that the spring cleaning up of the city was begun has been urged by the members of the board as one reason why the suspended inspectors should be returned to duty.

Mrs. Kelley's First Cause for Divorce Actuated on Her Wedding Day.

HUSBAND CONSTANT IN HIS CRUELTY

Sometimes Amused Himself by Blacking Her Face with Stove Polish—Food of Kicking and Pounding Her—She Wants Her Maiden Name.

The existence of Mary E. Kelley judging from the testimony in the divorce case commenced by her against her husband, John N. Kelley, and which is now on trial before Judge Keyser, since her marriage has been one of extreme misery.

At times he would vary the monotony of her misery by overturning the dinner table, besmearing her with soft boiled eggs or deluging her with buckets of cold water.

On August 1, 1893, he blackened her eyes and overturned everything in the house. He caught her unawares, pulled her down and jammed his fist into her mouth.

After receiving one of her severe beatings Mrs. Kelley had her husband arrested, but was unable to attend the preliminary hearing, owing to the injuries she received.
