BUCKEYE CAMPAIGN OPENS

Eight Thousand Republicans in Line at the Springfield Meeting.

THIRTY THOUSAND STRANGERS PRESENT Governor McKinley Formally Inaugurates the Senatorial Boom for Foraker and Sherman Talks on National Finance.

SPRINGFIELD, O., Sept. 10.—The opening of the republican state campaign here today is a great success. It is estimated at noon that between 20,000 and 40,000 strangers are in the city and they are still coming by train loads and in vessels. The streets are nearly impassable. Senator Sherman, Governor McKinley, General Jones, Chairman Kurtz and delegations from Columbus and the northern part of the state arrived at 11 and 11:30.

The parade began forming promptly at 12 o'clock. The procession is nearly two miles long. Fully 8,000 men were in line. The parade moved a little after 1 o'clock and arrived at the fair grounds a little after 2.
