Two More of the Members of the McCarty Gang in Prison.

PEOPLE OF SAPPY COUNTY FEEL SAFER

Neither of the prisoners displayed any feeling when the sentences were pronounced, but when they left the court room they cursed the judge in a very emphatic manner.

"I hope his tongue will be paralyzed when he sentences the next prisoner," Gallagher hotly remarked, with an oath.

The prisoners were at once taken to the penitentiary at Papillion. The Sappy county officials apparently thinking that the Douglas county jail would be a little too easy for them.

There was another reason why Gallagher and Chapin took their medicines with such good humor. Both men are suspected of being the murderers of a man and woman in Sioux City. An account of their connection with the double murder was fully and exclusively published in The Bee some time ago.

Sioux City, Ia., Nov. 12.—The mysterious double tragedy which occurred in this city early on the morning of August 25, the murder of Miss Ora Minter of Nebraska and Max Scaok, had today that indisputable evidence that the dual crime was committed by "Kid" Gallagher and Alex. It is certain that the hearing will occur outside the limits of the city and within the next few days, as the county attorney is anxious to have the matter disposed of.

MILTON ROGERS IS DEAD.

Another Omaha Pioneer Has Passed Away—Sketch of His Life.

Milton Rogers, one of Omaha's old and honored citizens, died at 5:30 o'clock yesterday morning at the family residence, Thirty-seventh and Half Howard streets.

Milton Rogers was one of the early settlers of Nebraska, and his death will be mourned by a large circle of friends, whose sorrow at his demise will be increased by recollections of long associations of pioneer days.

The deceased was surrounded by the members of his family when death came, and though his illness had extended over but a short period, his demise was not wholly unexpected.

Mr. Rogers left a family consisting of a wife and five children—four sons and one daughter. They are T. J. Rogers, Warren P. Rogers, Herbert M. Rogers, William S. Rogers and Mrs. Clara M. Rogers.

Mr. Rogers had always held a prominent position in business circles and has been the head of the firm of Milton Rogers & Sons for a large number of years.

At the time of his death he was past 73 years of age.

Milton Rogers was born in 1822 in Hancock county, Maryland, and spent his early years upon a farm in Columbia county, Ohio.

When 18 years old he went to New Lisbon, O., and learned the tin and copper-plate trade, after which he moved to Indiana, Missouri and Iowa.

In 1850 he commenced business in Council Bluffs, and in 1852 established a branch office in Omaha, removing to his side of the river a few months later.

In the early 70s, when Omaha was almost a wilderness, Mr. Rogers assisted in raising funds to aid in the construction of the Grand Central, which stood upon the site now occupied by the Pastors.

He was one of the original promoters of the waterworks and vice president of the same from 1850 to 1886. He was one of the original stockholders of the South Omaha stock and one of the original parties to the establishment of the Omaha Street Railway company.

Mr. Rogers always refused, though pressed hard, nominations for public office. He was a man of high character, esteemed by the community for his energy and sterling integrity.

The funeral will be from the late residence at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.
