

MINISTER TERRELL IS FIRM

Compels the Sultan to Protect the Lives of American Missionaries.

INQUIRING INTO THE KHARPUT AFFAIR

Turkish Troops Assigned to Escort Missionaries to Places of Safety and Officers Held Responsible for Their Lives.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 17.—(via Sofia, Bulgaria, Nov. 18.)—No details have yet been received here of the massacre of about 800 Armenians at Kharput, or of the sacking and burning of eight out of twelve of the buildings belonging to the American missionaries there, which outrages were recently announced by the Associated Press Standard.

At the request of the United States consulate the val of Aleppo has detailed certain Turkish officials of high rank to protect the American missionaries and to hold them responsible for the lives of those placed under their command.

ORDERED A SPECIAL INQUIRY

The Porte, it is said, has ordered special inquiries to be made into the massacre at Alexandretta, in northern Syria, where, as exclusively announced by the Associated Press early Saturday, 300 Turkish troops had been ordered to surround the place.
