The defendant was on the witness stand all day yesterday, and the direct examination was completed. The cross-examination was taken up and was partly finished at the adjournment of court. It is thought now that the defense will complete the presentation of its evidence on Tuesday, and that the case may go to the jury by Wednesday night.

SEVEN INDICTMENTS FOR FORGERY. Only a Small Portion of Altmanperger's Pecuniations Represented. Judge Smith has issued a restraining order preventing the sale of the Duncan shoe stock, which was to have taken place yesterday. The order was issued upon the application of Citizens State bank. In a position filed in the case the bank recited the giving of a chattel mortgage to the bank by B. M. Duncan for \$2,000. On the same day, and prior to the recording of the mortgage, another mortgage had been given by Duncan to Joseph Farrell for \$9,000. Farrell took possession and advised the bank of the same. The matter will now be transferred to the district court. Additional attachments were issued against the Duncan stock yesterday by John Stoutman for \$100, and by George E. Keith for \$78.75.
