TRAIN FALLS FORTY FEET

One Man Jumps from the Rear Platform and Escapes Unhurt.

FOUR PERSONS KILLED AND MANY WOUNDED

Engine and Two Passenger Coaches Precipitated to the Bottom of a Ravine by the Collapse of a Bridge.

EUREKA, Cal., Sept. 14.—Four persons were killed and sixteen seriously injured as the result of a wreck on the Arcata & Mad River railroad, about five miles north of Arcata last evening.

Injured: Conductor Harvey Sammons, badly injured. Engineer George Burke, badly scalded. Fireman Burke, escaped with a few bruises.

Mrs. Kate Limer, arm and leg broken. David Wood, badly injured. Miss Winthrop, leg and arm broken. Dan Maloney, badly injured. Two children of Mahoney, badly injured, one having jaw broken.

Miss Mary Zentara, leg broken. Miss Annie Zentara, seriously injured internally.

The Misses Zentara are nieces of Korbel brothers of San Francisco, owners of the railroad on which the accident occurred.

Miss Gregory and child of Eureka, both in a critical condition. Stephen Johnson of Glendale, badly bruised about body.

A. Sanders of Glendale, slightly hurt. Hermann Sanders, same place, badly cut on the head.

Miss Rosie Buddette, Italian peddler, badly shaken up.

The accident occurred to the regular passenger train consisting of an engine and two cars, which connected at Arcata wharf with the company's ferry boat, Alta, leaving here at 9:30 p. m.

The train had run out on the first span of the bridge when without warning the stringers gave way, letting the whole train drop forty feet to the gravel bed of the river, where the coaches were smashed.

She and Eggleston were to have been married in Council Bluffs this afternoon. She stated further that there has been trouble between herself and her mother since the latter married a Frenchman, Francois by name, who abused her.

On account of his ill-treatment she has been home very little of late years.


