Prominent Democrat Passes Away After Several Months' Illness.

HIS END COMES VERY UNEXPECTEDLY

ATLANTA, Oct. 23.—Charles F. Crisp, the ex-speaker of the house of representatives, died here today.

Mr. Crisp had been an inmate of the manitarium in this city for several weeks. His condition had been reported as very low, but no fatal conclusions to his illness had been expected so soon.
