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ELECT MUNICIPAL OFFICERS

Results of the Annual Conventions in the Nebraska Towns. LICENSE MAKES GAINS IN THE STATE

Several Places Formerly Run on the Prohibition Plan Will Be Provided with Saloons During the Coming Year.

ALBION, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—Albion goes dry. Arista Harris, pro-licensing, was elected mayor and Robert Patterson and Herbert M. Brown, both no-licensing, were elected councilmen.

ARRINGTON, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—The following were elected: Henry W. Schoettger, Fred Echtenkamp, O. K. Lewis, C. H. Linn and J. C. Blackburn. It is again to be a license town.

AURORA, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—The nonpartisan ticket was elected as follows: Mayor, W. Curry; clerk, J. B. Cunningham; treasurer, J. P. Chapman; all re-elected, councilmen, J. P. Forth, William Rutherford and U. J. Romf. License was submitted to a vote and was rejected.

BANCROFT, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—The election resulted in a majority of two in favor of high license and the victory of one populist, one democrat and three republicans named below as trustees for the coming year: F. B. Barber, populist; J. E. L. Carey, democrat; F. H. Park, G. H. Hanson and John Watson, republicans.

BATTLE CREEK, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—The election of town officers was a complete populist victory. The successful candidates were: Mayor, J. E. Peterson; councilmen, C. A. Lampert, Samuel McCallister and W. A. Venable.

BETHANY, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—The election resulted in the defeat of the pro-licensing ticket. The following were elected: Mayor, J. B. Decker and John Nellor were elected village trustees. All are republicans. There was no party issue.

BENNINGTON, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—The republican ticket was elected for village trustees as follows: Henry Arrp, M. H. Johnson, Charles G. Burnett, O. G. Gustafson, Paulsen, Frederichsen and Paulsen were on both tickets. Peter Bunz and Peter Mangold, who composed the balance of the citizens ticket, were elected.

BLAIR, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—The entire city ticket is republican with the exception of two councilmen, and the republican ticket was elected. The school board was elected by a majority of two. The school board stands for republicans, a good democrat and one free silver democrat.

CALHOUN, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—The election resulted as follows: L. Cronquist was elected mayor over E. N. Gernell, democrat, by a majority. L. Clasen, democrat, was elected treasurer and Will Clasen, democrat, was elected clerk.

CLAY CENTER, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—There were two tickets in the field; the republican and citizens' reform, the latter composed principally of populists. All of the republican nominees were elected by a majority of from thirty to forty. The day was rainy and cold, and a light vote was polled.

COZAD, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—There were two tickets in the field for village board of trustees—license and anti-license. The anti-license ticket was elected. The following were elected: Mayor, W. Perry, T. G. Reynolds, W. R. Patrick and A. M. White. There were no issues on the question, the board is probably against granting saloon license.

EXETER, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—The election passed off quietly. There were two tickets, a straight license and a non-partisan. A mixed ticket was elected as follows: A. D. Cook, non-partisan; W. L. Hill, populist; A. M. White, anti-license; R. R. Williams, non-partisan. License received a majority of two votes.

FALLS CITY, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—A very light vote was polled. There were two tickets in the field, one labeled prohibition, the other free silver. All the candidates were very close, and the result was a tie. The prohibitionists proposed to make war on bootleggers and drug store whisky. The following were elected, all by close margins: Mayor, H. A. Roberts, clerk; A. H. Latzke, treasurer; Z. R. Riggs, alderman; the prohibitionists elected C. M. Prickeatt, surveyor; J. A. Shively, alderman.

FALLS CITY, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—The entire city ticket was elected as follows: Mayor, H. A. Roberts; clerk, J. W. Towle, engineer; J. E. Leyda, police judge; Gus Neitzel, councilman; First ward, C. F. Cain, councilman; Second ward, L. A. Ryan, councilman; Third ward, W. H. Crook, T. P. Sullivan and W. L. White, members of the Board of Education.

FREMONT, April 7.—(Special Telegram)—Complete returns for members of the school board elect Miss Lucy Griswold, republican, for the short term, and Andrew Peterson, republican, for the long term. There is considerable dissatisfaction over the count in some of the wards. The ticket was not arranged in good shape. The candidates for both the short and long terms being grouped together in alphabetical order. There were two to be elected for the full term and one for a vacancy. It is said some votes were cast for three candidates for the long term and counted. A recount may be had, though it is doubtful if it would affect the result.

FULLERTON, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—The election was quiet. The republican ticket was elected as follows: Mayor, J. W.

McClendon, clerk, H. E. Wilson; treasurer, W. W. Barre; police judge, John Porterfield; councilman, First ward, W. B. Weeks; councilman, Second ward, Theodore C. Koch; councilman, Third ward, Lester Gleason; GOTTENBURG, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—A large vote was polled, although it snowed and rained all night. The following were elected: Mayor, J. E. WOOD RIVER, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—The following were elected trustees: E. T. Rounds, J. T. Carroll, J. E. Peterson, J. W. Mitchell and A. C. White. There were twelve other men, but none of them came within fifty votes of being elected.

WYMAN, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—The following were elected: Mayor, A. W. Padgett, silver-democrat; treasurer, C. D. Rubi, gold-democrat; clerk, O. F. Peter, republican; councilmen, J. P. Mosey, republican; J. D. Phillips, republican; F. F. Montford, republican, A. J. McElmer, silver-democrat. License carried.

Eight Days of Rain at Winslow. WINSLOW, Neb., April 7.—(Special Telegram)—After eight days of almost steady rain the sun has just begun to shine again.
