Defaulting State Treasurer Held to the District Court. WAIVES A PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION.

His Plea of Not Guilty is Entered and Bail Furnished in the Sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars.

LINCOLN, April 19.—(Special.)—Today was the time to which the adjournment of the case of the State of Nebraska against Joseph H. Bartley had been taken, and the parties appeared in court before Judge Cochran.

Attorney General Smith asked the court to raise the amount of the bond to \$100,000.

Mr. Whelan argued to the court that the bond was sufficient. The bail was not intended as a punishment. It was to insure the appearance of Mr. Bartley in court on the 2d of next month.

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WHEAT TAKES ANOTHER JUMP.

Figures for the Cereal Promptly Go Skyward on Change. EVERYBODY SEEMS ANXIOUS TO BUY.

Breaking Out of War in Europe the Moving Cause—Fluctuations Violent and No Uniformity in Prices.

CHICAGO, April 19.—The war news sent the wheat market skyward today. May wheat sold at high as 78 cents a bushel at the opening of trading on 'change, an advance of 4 1/2 cents over the closing figures of Saturday.

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Fluctuations were all the way from 77 to 78 cents at the same time in different parts of the pit. Most of the initial sales were at 77 to 77 1/2 cents, but for near futures purchases were being recorded at the top figures named.
