HOLCOMB INTERPRETS LAW

Gov. Pronounces One Statute to Be a Farce and a Sham. HE WAS NOT BOUND TO OBSERVE THAT LAW. Reason Advanced by the Governor Why He Did Not Require Bartley to Produce the State's Money.

Governor Holcomb said on the stand yesterday, in the state's suit against the Bartley bondsmen, that the state statute which is construed to mean that a governor shall require a state treasurer who succeeds himself to produce in cash state moneys that are not on deposit in state depositories, was a "farce and a sham." Therefore, he did not require Bartley to produce at the end of his first term some \$449,000 in money, but accepted certificates of deposit in lieu, which he did not move to get a writ to compel him to consider them to be so from their appearance. This is the first of testimony he was called upon to give by the state in order to refute the defendant's contention that he was not bound to observe that law.

When the populists took complete control of the state house last January it was loudly proclaimed that they would insist upon a cash settlement by the state of its liabilities. The populists would either have to show the cash and accept it upon a new deposit, or give new bonds to secure their holdings. One of the first things that Governor Holcomb did after taking possession of his office was to address a letter to the officials of all the solvent depository banks defining his position and requesting that they should return the funds of state funds back into the state treasury as soon as possible. In this letter he stated that if any of the banks wished to continue to hold depositories they might do so, but that he preferred them to furnish a new bond. It was further announced that many of the depository banks were adopting the populists' plan of giving new bonds to secure their holdings to the state treasury, some of them in bank and others in installments, and that two banks had at that time already furnished new bonds.

It would be supposed that with this announced policy Governor Holcomb would insist that the \$200,000 deposit, which he says was deposited in the First National bank of Lincoln, should be covered by some security on which the state could recover in case of loss. That much would be required by plain common sense. The fact is, however, that the bank that accommodated Treasurer Meserve with nearly \$500,000 on his official bond has been allowed to keep this money and has it today, though it has not yet put up a bond which Governor Holcomb would consent to approve.

Treasurer Meserve says he has not made any new deposit relative to the \$500,000 by Governor Holcomb, and has withdrawn some of the money, but admits that there is still on deposit unsecured except by this bond nearly \$150,000 of state money. Governor Holcomb is said to be aware of all these irregularities, but up to date he has taken no action either to require a new bond from the bank or to require a new bond from the bank with satisfactory securities the names which are reflected when presented by the bank.

YELLOW FEVER STILL RAGES.

Total Number of Deaths at New Orleans, Oct. 18.—Before 7 o'clock this evening the 100 mark of deaths during the present period of yellow fever prevalence had been reached. When the board of health closed its books last night there had been ninety-three fatal cases. Between that and the present time there have been reported, this century of deaths has occurred among less than 200 cases and has been reported to the board since early in September, and in the case of New Orleans, reports the existence of the cases of yellow fever in the city of Montgomery.

Montgomery, Ala., Oct. 18.—The Board of Health tonight issued the following official bulletin: "Dr. Dunn reports from Cayuga two new cases and two suspicious cases. T. C. Alexander reports from Deberry reports from Clinton two new cases, one case under treatment and one suspicious case."

Patrol reports from Edwards as follows: "Two new cases, both white; three deaths, Mrs. Pendell, Gus Havocott, Jr., Fannie Bryant, two white and one colored. No one is doing very well. No one is critically ill."

MOBILE, Ala., Oct. 18.—Six cases and one death is the yellow fever report for the past twenty-four hours. The cases are reported by Dr. McKnight. Total cases to date, 129; deaths, 22; recoveries, 106; under treatment, 40.

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Bartley then proceeded to relate how the accounting was made on January 8, 1895. The witness testified that Bartley had requested \$100,000 in depository banks. The cash in the treasury and money in some other banks. To that statement Bartley added what he had in his charge, which consisted of certificates of deposit, drafts and other papers. The total equaled the amount chargeable to the treasurer, so far as the witness knew. On January 8, 1895, the treasurer went to the treasurer's office and Bartley handed the statement to him. Bartley explained the statement to the governor and handed to him the books of certificates, which he had added to Bartley's statement. The governor checked the statement and the certificates and they apparently balanced.

Bartley did not know what the papers and certificates of deposit were, as Bartley kept them in a pocketbook, which was locked in the safe or in his desk. Bartley had no record of the certificates of deposit, which were not recorded in the books of the treasurer. So Bartley testified last week. He said that some open bank accounts were included in the certificates of deposit, which he said by the state to cover the alleged shortage of the first term.

NO ENTRY OF CERTIFICATES. Upon cross-examination Bartley stated that he had no entry on any of the books in the treasurer's office of these certificates of deposit. There was any record whatever kept on the books of the treasurer of these certificates of deposit, which he had made up the difference between your statement of the amount in depository banks and of the cash on hand and the amount which the treasurer was chargeable to, asked General Cowin. "No, sir."

"Were not the accounts carried on the books of the treasurer as if cash instead of the certificates of deposit were produced?" "Yes, sir." "Thus, according to the evidence so far produced, the books of the treasurer show that there should have been \$958,000 or more in the treasury, but that there was actually \$449,000 less accounted for by the same amount. This accounting shows that there was a shortage of \$449,000 on the part of Bartley, but Bartley made up the difference by producing certificates of deposit and drafts of the amount of \$449,000. The treasurer's record of these certificates was made on the books, but the books were carried as if the actual cash had been produced. Bartley again took the stand and testified that he had no access to them. The papers were put under Bartley's private key. Bartley of his own knowledge did not know whether the papers were really certificates of deposit."

GOVERNOR ON THE STAND.

Bartley also said that he did not know whether it was state money or Bartley's own money that appeared in the running account of the treasurer. He said that the entire amount included in the statement for Bartley was of the opinion that the money belonged to the state. The governor was called to the stand and, after being sworn, was asked to testify regarding this accounting with Bartley on January 8, 1895, about which Bartley had just been testifying.

Governor Holcomb said he told Bartley that it was his duty to ascertain the condition of the treasury and called for that purpose the books of Bartley. He and Bartley went over them. They ascertained the balance against the treasurer, the amounts in the depository banks and other accounts, consisting of certificates of deposit, almost exclusively of the amount in the education fund, "which could not be put in state depositories," and other accounts. When the governor had made this statement, Attorney General Smyth asked: "State whether or not the accounting on that day was carried out as you have described, and state whether you know it?"

SMYTH MAKES AN OFFER. The defense at once objected, saying that it was for the jury and the court to determine whether or not a default was committed. The objection was sustained. The attorney general then whispered an offering to the court reporter, so that the jury might not hear it. The offering was a check for \$449,000, the witness that Bartley was not a defaulter at the end of his first term and that Governor Holcomb did not know he was a defaulter. The governor was asked to return to the stand on the matter of the filing of the bond and he flatly contradicted the statement of the witness that he had taken the bond that had not been filed till January 9, 1895. Governor Holcomb said: "The bond had been filed in the office of the secretary of state on January 8, 1895, when Bartley presented it to me for approval."

GOVERNOR HOLCOMB CONTRADICTED. The secretary of state, Secretary of State Piper that after the governor refused to approve Bartley's bond Bartley carried the bond away with him. The governor said that Bartley was in his office at 5:30 o'clock on January 8, 1895, but that he did not present the bond to him until some time after 10 o'clock, and that one else was present. Governor Holcomb told Bartley that he could not approve the bond for lack of time. The governor kept the bond for some time, and then returned it to Bartley. It was then that Bartley secured the additional signatures in this city.

COWIN ALLEGES NEGLECT.

Upon cross-examination General Cowin set out from the beginning to attempt to show by Governor Holcomb that he had been negligent in not requiring Bartley to have the actual cash in the treasury. General Cowin insisted that the statutes required in the case of a state treasurer who succeeds himself to produce in cash the amount of his bond until he had "produced and accounted" for public funds and property. He maintained that the treasurer should not have accepted the certificates of deposit, which he had produced and accounted for, but that he had neglected to require Bartley to have the actual cash in the treasury. General Cowin for almost an hour cross-examined the governor on his construction of his statute.

Governor Holcomb said he knew there was a statute that contemplated that the governor should not approve the bond of a treasurer who succeeds himself until he had produced and accounted for the amount of his bond. He did not think that a big amount of money and therefore under the circumstances regarded as proper that it should be placed in other banks.

CERTIFICATES APPEARED GENUINE. In answer to further questioning the governor said that he had no recollection of having seen some fifteen or twenty banks, but he had made no memoranda of them. He did not know whether or not they were genuine, but he believed that they were. The certificates represented funds that belonged to the education fund. General Cowin again asked several questions whether he did not know that the treasurer could not legally place the funds except in depository banks and the treasury, but the court would not allow them over objections.

General Cowin then turned his attention to the matter of the presentation of the bond to the governor by Bartley on January 8, 1895. He said that he had no recollection of having seen the bond that day, but that he had seen it on January 9, 1895. Bartley's sureties were insufficient and suggested that he should get additional signatures. He said he did not examine the bond, but that he had seen it on January 9, 1895. General Cowin gave the bond to the gov-

ernor and asked him to indicate what signatures were on it when it had been presented to him. The state objected. General Cowin stated that he intended to show that the bond was not genuine. He said that on January 8, 1895, that it was taken away that same day by Bartley; that Bartley secured additional signatures and then brought back the bond. He said that he intended to show that the instrument had not been properly filed. Judge Powell took the point under advisement, as the regular hour for adjourning the clock had arrived.

PEST OF WILD HORSES.

Story of an Attempt to Capture a Band in Arizona. "We've got a new kind of game now in Arizona," said a man from Flagstaff to a correspondent of the New York Post, "and if you tenderfoot are after some sport, and want to be chased off the top of the earth, I can take you to the place. What is it? Why, horses. Just plain bronchos, and as good a lot of kinees as you ever saw. The fact is, the whole northern part of Arizona is overgrown with them, and I'm taking a petition to Attorney General Hager, asking that the territory either pay no much for their scraps or give the boys the legal right to clean them out."

"It's my private opinion," added the correspondent, "that the wild horses have got the start, and nothing will save them but a company of cavalry. They are just like deer, and as vicious as possible, and the man that corners them has to look out for himself. They are ordinary horses that have escaped from bands from time to time, and formed in a herd under the lead of a stallion. As they have increased they have become a pest to the farmers. They are on the ranges, eating good fodder, stampeding cattle and sheep, and making a nuisance of themselves. Last month I went out on a regular horse hunt with a party, and the animals were in the band near five splendid horses, led by a stallion named Blake Hawk, as black as night. We thought we would take them in and break them; so we started off with lariats. We were all mounted on our own horses, and in this section, and we thought it would be a more lark to run them in. The band had been stampeding our stock, and finally got so bold they came up near the camp on the run, then stop short and look at us, giving a sort of challenge, as it were, and then whetted off like the wind. We rode across the mesa for about ten miles without seeing a thing; then one of our party thought we were being followed by a big bunch of horses. We were all on our guard and in a few minutes it dawned upon us that they were a band of wild bronchos. We were moving along in a bunch and the lead horse was a fine specimen of a horse, looking like a big comet flying along the ground with the fall in the air.
