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WANT CLUB IN OMAHA

Johnson and Loftus Are Favorable to Gate City.

THINK IT IS A GOOD TOWN FOR BALL

Both Are Particularly Anxious to Have Nebraska's Metropolis Come into the Western the Coming Season.

DUBUQUE, Ia., Nov. 26.—(Special Telegram.)—President Dan Johnson, of the Western League, is here visiting Manager Loftus of the Columbus club. Both say a proposition from Anson to place a Western League club in Chicago would be acceptable, but Anson has intimated no such desire and they regard Omaha as altogether the most likely candidate for the place made vacant by Grand Rapids. Loftus seems particularly anxious to see a Western League club established at Omaha.

AMEN COLLEGE ATHLETIC RULES.

Representatives of Western Universities Hold a Conference. CHICAGO, Nov. 26.—Representatives of a number of leading western colleges met here today and it was decided to present to the National Athletic Union a set of athletic rules in several particulars. The meeting today was preliminary in its nature, but there is no doubt the changes suggested will be carried out. They are as follows: (1) Four-year limit for college athletes; preparatory students to be barred from college athletics; games with outside colleges to be regarded as "practice games"; further elimination of rough football; the colleges which are "practice" members are Northwestern University, Purdue University, Chicago University, University of Illinois, University of Michigan, University of Minnesota, University of Wisconsin.

It was decided that no student can play on a college football team until he has attended college at least one year. The most important action taken was the adoption of a resolution calling for less brutality in football.

CORNELL WILL NOT CHALLENGE.

Being Champion It Will Wait on Other Colleges. NEW YORK, Nov. 26.—Prof. Benjamin I. Wheeler, the advisory member of the Cornell Athletic club, in the city for a few days. It is understood that Prof. Wheeler had come to New York to confer with some Yale parties relative to the challenge which Yale is reported to have raised to issue to Cornell for university boat races next season.

Prof. Wheeler said: "I am not here to see any Yale parties. The Cornell Athletic club is considering the advisability of such a step. I am here to confer with Cornell alumni and to see if they can be of any help in Cornell's best action in case such a challenge is received by Yale. The Cornell Athletic club will not issue any challenge, but will be willing to run any race on fair conditions. In all probability no decision will be made in regard to races until the beginning of the winter season. Cornell will be willing to receive and consider all propositions for races next season."

OBJECTING TO THE NEW TEMPLE.

Disagreement Among the Odd Fellows at Indianapolis. INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 26.—Water Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows today filed a suit in the circuit court to prevent the carrying out of the present plans to build the new \$200,000 grand lodge Odd Fellows temple at Washington and Pennsylvania streets in this city. It claims an ownership in a present building on the corner of Washington and Pennsylvania streets and demands that the property be sold for the partition of the proceeds. It asks an injunction to prevent the carrying out of the present plan and to prevent the placing of a mortgage on the property for the purpose of erecting a new building.

Center lodge has opposed the action in regard to the new building at several stages, and notice of the proposed suit was given a few days ago. It is asserted by the lodge that it was about to sign articles of lodge has tried to sell its stock in the old property at an exorbitant price.

Sargent of St. Louis, led the list of winners, each scoring twenty. The big end of the purse was divided among these three. In the shoot-off for the diamond trophy Fanning won, scoring fourteen out of fifteen. Sargent followed with eleven, and Budd dropped out on his twelfth. Twenty-three experts shot in the event.

PRISONERS ATTACK THE SHERIFF.

Deputies Interfere and Force the Criminals Away. PRINCETON, Ind., Nov. 26.—Nineteen prisoners confined in the Gibson county jail declared themselves in open revolt against Sheriff Murphy today. For several days they had been in a state of rebellion, and their throats have been made by the prisoners and the sheriff had been warned. This morning the men declared they would have more food or kill the sheriff. A posse of deputies was placed outside the jail while Sheriff Murphy entered alone. As soon as he entered the jail, the prisoners, headed by John Boger, a notorious criminal, rushed upon him and were about to carry out their threat to kill the sheriff. The sheriff fired a shot which occurred between Boger and Murphy, and Boger was beaten almost into insensibility and then thrown into a cell. The other prisoners were then ordered to disperse, and they were dispersed by the deputies.
