

UNION OF LOCAL CHURCHES

Seven of the Christian Denomination Plan Closer Co-Operation.

PRELIMINARY STEPS ARE ALREADY TAKEN

Meeting at the First Christian Church of Omaha Brings About the Early Alliance of the Several Congregations.

The seven churches of the Christian denomination in Omaha, South Omaha and Council Bluffs yesterday morning effected a close union for the purpose of greater co-operation, especially as concerns the management of the finances of the respective churches.

The proceedings leading up to the formation of the union were held in connection with the regular Sunday morning services at the First Christian church in this city. Preparatory to the sermon by the new pastor, Rev. D. D. Burt, formerly state evangelist, a business session of the church and congregation was held.

At the conclusion of Judge Slabough's remarks it was resolved that the church should take the initial steps looking toward such a union. It was decided to appoint a committee of five to confer with the representatives of the other Christian churches relative to the proposed union.
