IOWANS AND THE OFFICES

Candidates Are Numerous and Some Nominations Are Already Made.

SEVEN OF THE CONGRESSMEN NAMED

Three Districts Still in Doubt—Few Democratic Candidates—State Conventions Will Soon Be Held by the Three Parties.

DES MOINES, Ia., July 24.—(Special.)—In seven of the congressional districts of Iowa the next congressmen have been named in republican conventions, in one other there is no doubt about the result and there are three interesting contests yet to be settled. The democrats and their populist allies comprising the popocratic party are still doing very little to prepare for the campaign either in the congressional districts or in the state in general. They have nominated but one fusionist candidate for congress and he is, or claims to be, a republican, and his record was made as a republican legislator in the state house and in the state senate where the popocrats have any show of success this year and this is the chief reason for lack of interest in the congressional nominations.

The congressional nominees already named by the republicans are Thomas Hedge of Dubuque, in the First district; D. B. Henderson of Dubuque in the Second; John F. Lacey of Oskaloosa, in the Sixth; Robert G. Coustons of Tipton, in the Fifth; William Peters Hepburn of Clarinda, in the Eighth; Jonathan P. Dolliver of Fort Dodge, in the Tenth; and Lot Thomas of Boone, in the Eleventh. In the Seventh district John A. Tull of Des Moines is sure to be the nominee without opposition. His convention will be held at Knoxville next Wednesday. The only interest the convention will have will be in the fight for control of the congressional committee on the fact that the union Hull will be there in person. Five of the congressmen already nominated had no opposition.

Three Doubtful Districts. The contest in the Fourth district is peculiar. Some time ago the rumors of opposition to the re-nomination of Congressman Thomas Undergraff were started and then it was announced that all opposition had been silenced and that Undergraff would be re-nominated. Later the opposition developed strongly and now there are a number of candidates in the field, openly or covertly. The convention will be held in a month at New Hampton. Gilbert N. Hagen of Fort county is an avowed candidate. He is the ex-attorney general of the state. Senator Trewin of Allamakee county, Representative Eaton of Mitchell county, Judge Reed of Howard county, D. W. Clements of Fayette county and James E. Blythe of Cerro Gordo county have all announced their opposition to Undergraff, but as few of the county conventions have been held it is not yet known what shape the contest will take at the finish.

In the Second district every republican who has been brought out as a probable candidate is a republican. George M. Curtis, the present congressman, has declined to run, but as few of the county conventions have been held it is not yet known what shape the contest will take at the finish.

There has been some talk of opposition to Herriot for treasurer, but it may not develop. J. C. Haebler of Delaware county and D. L. Heinheiser of Mills county have been mentioned. In none of the contests on state office has the situation got to the point where predictions would be safe on the outcome.

Fatal End of a Quarrel. BOONE, Ia., July 24.—(Special.)—John Kolm of Swede Valley in this county is dead, the victim of an old quarrel. Kolm and Charles Erlson attended a church social and the old quarrel coming up they began to quarrel and fight. As a result Kolm died before he could be taken home, though the exact cause of his death is not known.

More Returning Klondikers Bring Half a Million Dollars and Tales of Hard Luck. SEATTLE, Wash., July 24.—One hundred and thirteen Klondikers who arrived at Victoria this morning on the steamer "Albatross" left for Seattle this afternoon. A conservative estimate places the amount of gold they brought at half a million dollars. Dr. D. W. Ward of Portland, Ore., says there are many who have large amounts of gold on the other hand many are coming out broke.

H. N. Jacobson of Sacramento is said to have \$55,000, and is probably the largest individual holder of the yellow stuff. Of two brothers of Philadelphia who are reported to have \$50,000 each in dust, the story is told they refused to put their treasure in the steamer's safe. They guarded it all the way down, taking watches of six hours each. They said they were going to take it to Philadelphia and would not let it go out of their sight one minute.

H. G. Gray of Portland, with four others, was capsized while floating down the Klondike river in a small boat. All lost what they had made during the winter.
