MRS. SHELBY SUING AGAIN

Old Fight Over the Creighton Estate is Renewed in a New Position. The Edward Creighton estate again comes up in the courts and Mrs. B. Shelby, the daughter of the late Joseph Creighton, is again the plaintiff. Through her attorneys, W. D. Beckett and J. W. Woodruff, she filed a petition in the district court yesterday contesting the sale of 79,000 head of cattle, some horses, ranches and ranch outfits in Wyoming, at Cheyenne, made in January, 1877, by Thomas A. McShane, the Wyoming administrator and one of the partners of the deceased, to John A. Creighton for \$75,000.

Judge Gordon Declines to Believe in the Testimony of a Barber Who Was Victim.
