VOLUMINOUS DECISION IN THE CASE

LINCOLN, Aug. 19.—(Special.)—Deputy Insurance Commissioner Bryant this afternoon handed down an opinion in the case of the State Life Insurance company of Indiana, against which a complaint was filed some time ago by sixteen resident insurance agents of Omaha.

CONFUSION IN THE BIG SIXTH

Effort to Fuse Different Elements is a Failure.

ALL INSIST ON NAMING THE CANDIDATE

Result is Democrats Stand by M. C. Harrington and Populists by the State Candidate, Judge Neville.

LEXINGTON, Neb., Aug. 19.—(Special Telegram.)—A telegram was received here today from M. C. Harrington, announcing that he would remain in the field as the democratic candidate for congress of the Sixth district.

LEXINGTON, Neb., Aug. 19.—(Special Telegram.)—The democratic and populist conventions, which assembled here last night to nominate a candidate for congress in the Sixth district, ended this morning in one of the worst tangles imaginable.

The democratic convention organized by the election of Juan Boyle of Kearney as chairman and W. P. McNeil of North Platte as secretary. There were sixteen counties represented. The call for nominations brought out M. C. Harrington of North Platte and P. H. Barry of Greeley. The first ballot resulted in the nomination of Harrington by a vote of 408 to 225.

The populist convention J. E. Morrison of Logan county was chosen chairman and P. B. Carley of Dawes and L. Ward of Dawson secretaries. Neville was nominated on the fifth ballot by the following vote: Neville, 108; Barry, 74; Stewart, 12; Taylor, 12.

Conference committees were appointed by both the democratic and populist conventions, and these committees worked until 3 o'clock in the morning, reporting from time to time to the main conventions. The conferences were of no avail, however. The democrats insisted they were entitled to the nomination and were bound to have it or there would be no fusion. The populists were just as insistent that the nomination belonged to them and then it always came back to the same old proposition.

The democrats finally tired of the useless conferences and on motion the convention adjourned sine die. No sooner was this accomplished than the populist delegates set to work to repair the broken lines and after considerable work succeeded in getting the democrats together again, though it is not quite clear what right the body had to transact business after it had adjourned without day.

So far as reaching an agreement is concerned, however, the session was just as barren of results as the former and regular one. The populists continued to insist on Neville and the democrats on M. C. Harrington. Harrington finally withdrew, but the democratic convention refused to name any one else as its candidate or to endorse anyone else. The conventions finally adjourned with matters in that shape.

The democratic judicial convention also adjourned without endorsing Judge Sullivan, the populist nominee.

The more the democratic delegates think of the matter today the madder they get and openly declare Neville shall never have the democratic endorsement and that they will see to it that he does not get the democratic vote, which cuts a very considerable figure in this district. The chances of the republicans carrying the big Sixth district were bright before, but it looks like a certainty now that the last popericat congressman has been returned from here.

HASTINGS, Neb., Aug. 19.—(Special Telegram.)—There was plenty of politics in Hastings carrying the big Sixth district, where democrats held their county conventions to elect delegates to the state and judicial conventions. As John Stevens, democrat, and A. B. Batty, populist, both of Hastings, are candidates for the district judgeship, there was a hard and protracted fight on in both towns, and everything but harmony prevailed. The democrats held their convention first, with Lem Tibbetts presiding. A motion was made to the effect that Mr. Stevens be allowed to choose his own delegates. This opened the floodgates for the storm that here is nothing in being. Lanning and Editor Wahlquist argued with the convention in behalf of some fusionists. Editor Wahlquist in his remarks accused Stevens of assisting the populists to appoint offices and neglecting the democratic cause. Stevens denied the charges and followed, with the result that the convention voted Mr. Stevens the right to select his own delegates.

While the democrats were about in the thickest of their fray the populists were preparing a bomb to explode at the next court room. It was only by a narrow margin that the populists prevailed. Mr. Tibbetts presided as chairman of the populist convention, and he had not been as stern as he was in all probability the convention would still be in session. The real trouble came when the delegates were being selected for the state convention. Sam Milliner accused Batty and others of doing some underhanded work, whereupon Batty retaliated by saying that he would not permit his honor and integrity to be questioned by anyone like Mr. Milliner. He then turned the tables on Milliner by showing up the scheme that had been worked on Batty's crowd at the caucus.

Several times during the heated discussion that followed the chairman threatened to have both gentlemen removed from the court room. It was only by chance that the convention ever waded through this difficulty. The trouble in the convention has put the Adams county delegates to the judicial convention in such a shape that there is no telling where they stand at the present time. Mr. Stevens and Batty both stand a poor chance of receiving the nomination, as they have practically killed each other off by the bitter fight made to secure delegates.

NELSON, Neb., Aug. 19.—(Special Telegram.)—The populists of Nuckolls county met in convention here today. The following ticket was placed in nomination: County treasurer, R. H. Hutchinson; clerk, Fred Pebring; sheriff, Dan Burd; county superintendent of public instruction, Gurt Nichols. The clerk of court and county judge George Fling and O. W. Pebler respectively were renominated.

MINDEN, Neb., Aug. 19.—(Special Telegram.)—The populists and democrats held their county conventions today and fused. Each convention appointed a conference committee. Upon a motion to adopt fusion in the populist convention a heated discussion followed and it was said it would take votes to fuse. The ticket is not strong and there is some talk of another ticket. Ed L. Adams was endorsed by the populist convention. The republican convention will be held September 2. A good ticket will be nominated and elected.

NORFOLK, Neb., Aug. 19.—(Special Telegram.)—The democrats of Madison county assembled at this place yesterday afternoon and after listening to an address from "Coin" Harvey and selecting delegates to the state and judicial conventions, adjourned subject to the call for the chairman. An adjournment was taken for the reason that the populists, who had called the convention at a later date, had warned the democrats that if an attempt was made to hog all the good positions on the ticket there would be a row in the fusion camp. Only 100 delegates out of the 172 entitled to seats in the convention were present.

Big Distillery May Start Up. DES MOINES, Ia., Aug. 19.—(Special Telegram.)—The American Spirits company, owning the big International distillery in this city, which has been operated only as a malting house since prohibition went into effect, refuses to lease the property to be operated as a malting house, and has ordered that some extensive repairs be made on the building.

Considerable speculation has been indulged in as to what the policy of the trust will be toward the plant. Resident parties who were at one time identified with its operation claim not to know what is to be done with the property, but others claim to have information to the effect that as soon as a manufacturers' consent petition is obtained in this city the plant will be placed in operation again for the manufacture of high wine for export trade.
