

WHITE CITY WILL BE SOLD

Buildings to Greater America Exposition to Go for \$50,000.

CHICAGO WRECKING COMPANY PURCHASER

Will Take Possession November 1. Closing Day of the Big Show—Deal to Be Consumed Today—New Lease of Life.

A deal was brought about Thursday afternoon at a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Greater America Exposition whereby the buildings and plant will, for a consideration of \$50,000, be turned over to the Chicago Wrecking Company of Chicago...

Committee Grows Jubilant. The greater portion of the committee were jubilant over the sale and at the close of the meeting expressed themselves to the effect that the big show would take a new lease of life and at once. The fact that at the close of the exposition \$50,000 was at hand would allay any uneasiness that was obtaining among creditors and would give the committee something to work upon.

Another matter of encouragement to the members of the committee was an offer from the Omaha Water Works company to take the water plant from their hands at a fair market value. The committee thinks that with the money realized from this the lagoon may be filled up and all vestiges of the exposition removed from sight as though it had never been.

The Chicago Wrecking company, upon taking possession of the buildings on the day the big show comes to a close, will immediately begin to tear down the structures and prepare to ship the lumber and other salvages to Chicago. This company was the one that dismantled the World's fair at Chicago and also took down the old Chicago postoffice building.

Excursions Are Commended. The matter of Burlington excursions came up in the meeting also and the action of that road was commended. The announcement that the road would run in excursions to the big show on September 12, 13 and 14 was greeted with approval.

The news of the sale of the buildings was received down town with many evidences of satisfaction and the general opinion expressed is that the exposition is saved and that it has at last been put on its feet. A pall of gloom has been hanging over the White City for some time and rumors of the closing up of the show have been rife for several days.

KIDNAPING COMPLAINT MADE

Deputy Sheriff Barry of Cleveland May Be Brought to Omaha for Trial.

STEPS TAKEN WITH THAT END IN VIEW

Sheriff McDonald Demands that Kidnaped Rose Be Returned to Omaha—If This is Done Prosecution of Barry Will Be Dropped.

A formal complaint of kidnaping Antonio Rose has been made against Deputy Sheriff Barry of Cleveland. A telegram and a letter have been sent to the sheriff of Cleveland apprising him of the abduction of Rose and asking that no returns be made upon the requisition papers in the possession of Barry, and that the prisoner, who has now reached the scene of his alleged crime of embezzlement, be returned to Cleveland.

When Sheriff McDonald learned that a complaint had been lodged against Barry he went to the assistant county attorney and the attorneys for Rose and secured an agreement from them that a certain step be taken in the matter until he had an opportunity to communicate with the sheriff of Cleveland, explain the circumstances surrounding the involuntary return of Rose to Ohio and ascertain if he is not willing, under the present circumstances, to re-accept Rose to this city.

Do not make return on requisition of Rose, in charge of Barry, until you hear from me by mail. The following letter was then dictated to the sheriff, which ought to reach him Friday: "Sheriff Cuyahoga County, Cleveland, O.—Dear Sir: In compliance with my telegram to you of August 7, herewith I make you acquainted with the conditions connected with the case of A. Rose, whom your deputy, Mr. Barry, has just taken from this state on requisition. The prisoner was discharged twice on writs of habeas corpus, the last on August 7, 1899. The requisition was defective, as also was the original complaint on which the Ohio governor issued his requisition. Mr. Barry, however, arrested Rose on the requisition of our governor and got him out of the state contrary to the orders of the governor.

SOUTH OMAHA NEWS.

City Clerk Carpenter has just issued his annual report, which shows the amount of warrants issued and charged to the different departments from January 1, 1898, to August 31, 1899. According to this report the sum of \$110,255.60 was spent by the city during the last fiscal year.

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ALASKA AGREEMENT IN SIGHT

Negotiations So Far Concluded Said to Favor the American Side and Claims.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—While gratifying progress has been made toward the arrangement of amodus vivendi between the United States and Great Britain in the negotiations for the settlement of the boundary line between Alaska and British Columbia and the officials concerned in the negotiations are hopeful that success will attend their efforts, it can be stated that at this moment the negotiations are still running on a very quiet and unexciting basis.

State department officials insist that while it is not within reason to expect that any arrangement fair and satisfactory to both parties to the negotiations shall be entirely one-sided, still it will be found when the result is made public that the United States has secured a majority of the points in contention and that the opposition has made concessions of the greatest importance.

More Fever Cases at Key West. Dr. McLanahan of the Navy Will Get Well—Miami's Isolated Case.
