PRIVATE JOCKENS ON TRIAL

Contest-Martial Further Investigates Killing of Private Morgan While Attempting to Escape.

The trial of Private Henry K. Jockens, Company M, Tenth Infantry, for homicide was begun before court-martial yesterday at department headquarters in The Bee building.

The defendant testified that it was not his intention to kill the fugitive; that he had intended merely to subdue him. Upon examination, he had found that Morgan had been shot in the back, the bullet emerging through the right breast.

The verdict was taken under consideration and may not be rendered for several weeks. An army officer connected with the court-martial, however, expressed the opinion that the killing of Morgan was a very plain execution of duty and implied that Corporal Faure and Private Jockens would be fully justified in their course.
