MANY MEASURES FAVORED

What Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress Recommends.

NICARAGUA CANAL MUST BE BUILT. Cripple Creek, Colo., Selected as the Place for the Next Meeting of the Congress—Papers Read.

HOUSTON, Tex., April 19.—The session of the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress today was well attended.

The reception given Mr. Lowe's paper on the Nicaragua canal evidence, the great interest which is taken on that question. There was applause throughout, but this was vehement when he declared that the time had come for the United States to build the canal without asking the consent of Great Britain or any European power.

The committee on resolutions made a report of which the following is a synopsis and which was adopted:

First—That the consular service should be thoroughly organized upon a basis of efficiency that would be without reference to the present.

Second—Favoring the immediate admission of the states of New Mexico, Arizona and Oklahoma.

Third—That sheep should be permitted to graze upon public domain set apart for any special purpose.

Fourth—Favoring a government department of commerce and industries.

Fifth—Favoring a government department of improvement and development of harbors.

Sixth—Indorsing the product of a ship channel from the Gulf of Mexico to Houston, and earnestly urging upon the national congress the speedy construction of such a ship channel, to be of the depth of twenty-five feet and a width of one hundred feet.

Seventh—Asking for the early construction of a harbor of the first class at the mouth of the Brazos.

Eighth—Indorsing the bill providing for the government taking charge at once of the jetties at the mouth of the Mississippi and improving the Southwest pass.

Ninth—Indorsing the senate bill for the encouragement of the mining, mineral and geologic survey of the United States.

Tenth—Asking the national congress to settle the boundary questions which now vex the people of the Indian territory.

Eleventh—Favoring the speedy construction of a Pacific cable to Alaska, China, Japan and the Philippines, indorsing the bill providing for a cable from San Francisco to Honolulu.

At the conclusion of the committee's report Dr. Tichenor of New Orleans delivered an address on "The Mississippi and the Mouths Thereof."

Dr. Young of Utah addressed the congress on the "Future Development of Utah."

Judge J. M. Lowe of Kansas City was the next speaker and there was applause at his appearance.

H. C. R. Broadbald of Oklahoma made a brief talk on the reasons why that territory should be admitted as a state.

Chairman Moses of the executive committee gave notice that tomorrow plans would be presented for the organization of the Trans-Mississippi Commercial congress on a permanent basis with a regular membership.

The time for the selection of the next place of meeting having arrived, Cripple Creek and New Orleans were placed in nomination. When Arkansas voted for Cripple Creek, New Orleans withdrew and the Colorado city was selected by acclamation.

John H. Paxton Tells What He Saw at the Time of the Shooting by Colson.

FRANKFORT, Ky., April 19.—The opening of the third day of the trial of Colson was delayed almost an hour owing to the absence of Commonwealth's Attorney Franklin, and to the absence of a witness, John R. Paxton of Anderson county.

Paxton came in and testified that he was talking to Charles Julian when the fight commenced. He could not tell who fired the first shot, as he did not know there was any trouble until he heard the first shot.

He said it was his impression that a man named Green fired the shot which killed the first shot. He saw Colson follow Scott to the stairs. Colson stopped at the head of the steps and fired a shot down the stairs at Scott. Dr. G. F. Thompson testified as to the wounds on Scott's body and head.

J. M. Harrove of Somerset county, old home told of the meeting of Colson and Scott at the republican convention at Lexington last July.

Attorney Franklin announced that the commonwealth, with the exception of Sheriff Watson, either was ready to close.

The attorneys for the defense agreed to permit Watson to testify as soon as he arrives. Attorney Williams stated his case to the jury and the testimony for the defense commenced.

Judge Williams in stating the case said the defense would prove that Scott had made threat after threat that he would kill Colson on sight; that Colson dreaded meeting Scott and did everything to avoid a meeting; that Colson tried to get around Scott and that he thought it necessary to shoot for his own protection.

More Indictments in Goebel Case.

FRANKFORT, Ky., April 19.—The indictments returned by the grand jury this morning were against John W. Davis and Green Golden as accessories to the murder of Governor Goebel.

Green Golden, the man indicted as being an accessory to the murder of Governor Goebel, is a cousin of Wharton Golden, who turned state's evidence. John W. Davis, also indicted, was a policeman on the capitol square, and who tried to escape from Frankfort with Caleb Powers.
