Jack London is the name which has been appearing for some time with increasing frequency in periodical literature. It is that of a young man who promises to take a prominent place among American writers of romance and adventure.

"The Immortal Garland" is a distinctively American novel, treating most entertainingly of personal, artistic and social evolution. Most of its action takes place in New York.

"The Rhymer" by Allan McAuley, is a Scotch story of the latter part of the eighteenth century, in which the poet Burns is made to play a prominent and not very reputable part.

"Princess Sophia" is a fantastic romance by E. F. Benson, the novel-writing son of the late Archbishop of Canterbury.

THURSTON ON THE GROUND Returns Him to Repair Political Fences for Coming Convention. SAYS HE HAS NO ALLIANCES WHATSOEVER Asserts His Willingness to Take General Henderson for Vice President This Time.

Senator John M. Thurston arrived in Omaha yesterday over the Burlington from Chicago. The senator, who accompanied and immediately went to his home, where he remained all morning conferring with political friends who called.

Several months ago I announced that I would be a candidate for delegate-at-large and an all-out of the same mind. My desire for attending the convention in that capacity is that I presided over the convention which nominated McKinley the first time.

One Question Evaded. "Senator, it has been stated by the man supposed to be caring for your interests in the state that Douglas county will have two delegates-at-large to the convention, or none, did he speak with your authority?"

Speaking of the national situation, the senator stated that he was not interested in the present president nominated from a western state, and that he believed General Henderson to be the ideal candidate.

With his record in war, in the senate and in his profession, Mr. Thurston, "there is no man who will compare with him who is available for the place. His knowledge of the work of the senate and his experience in that body would give him great advantage over others as a presiding officer, but in a matter of speculation entirely at present."

Senator Thurston will remain in the west about a month. He has no literary convention at Kearney, April 26.
