Matthews was recalled by the defense today in the Goebel murder trial and testified that telegrams signed by George Denny of Lexington and filed immediately after the assassination were sent to seven persons in different parts of the state, saying that the riot had commenced and told the receivers to send different numbers of men to Frankfort at once.

His Nomination to Be a Matter of Form at Sioux Falls. CONTEST WILL COME OVER SECOND PLACE.

Towns of Minnesota to Be Represented by a Crowd of Boomers and Sulzer's Friends Are at Work.

SIoux FALLS, S. D., May 6.—The city is rapidly filling up with the advance guard of the national populist convention, Secretary Edgerton of Denver, secretary of the national committee, and B. Gray of the Colorado state committee have arrived and are arranging the preliminary details.

The real work of the convention will begin Tuesday. The name most often mentioned for temporary chairman is James H. Davis of Texas. George F. Washburn of Boston is also mentioned. Senator Harris of Kansas is spoken of either for temporary chairman or as a member of the convention.

METHODISTS AT WORK EARLY

Conference Sessions Open Promptly at 8:40 in the Morning.

CHICAGO, May 5.—Delegates to the Methodist general conference were more prompt than usual in taking their seats in the Auditorium theater today. The impression prevailed that the constitutional exercises were to begin at 9 o'clock, but yesterday Bishop Warren ordered the exercises to open at 8:40 o'clock and announced that the delegates would be expected to be in their seats at 8:30.

The constitutional services today were conducted by Fayette L. Thompson of Michigan, while Bishop Walden presided over the business session.

Great Significance Attached to Austrian Ruler's Doings at Berlin.

KAISER HEADS AUSTRO-HUNGARIAN ARMY

Crack Regiments of Germany Reviewed by the Two Emperors—Numerous Fetes Hold Courts in German Capital.

“Copyright, 1900, by Associated Press.” BERLIN, May 5.—This was another ideal spring day, regular “kaiser weather.” Just the thing for the interesting army maneuvers being in progress. Emperor William and Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria left the depot promptly at 8 a. m., arriving on the immense plain of Juetterbogk, where the sham fight were arranged, by 9 o'clock.

The most interesting features of sharp-shooting were witnessed and explanations were given the Austrian emperor by Emperor William and General von Goslar, the minister of war, and Count von Schlieffen, the chief of the general staff, about the improvements, hitherto held strictly secret, of both the German army rifle of the latest pattern and the new field guns. These explanations were made to Emperor Francis Joseph alone and not to his military suite.
