### ROADS NOTIFY SHIPPERS

#### Cars Must Be Unloaded Hereafter Within Forty-Eight Hours.

### IRONCLAD AGREEMENT IS ADOPTED

#### Demurrage Charges to Be Levied Against All Cars that Are Not Unloaded Within the Specified Time.

Prominent shippers of Omaha have advised that beginning next week, the ironclad rules of the Western Car Service association will become effective in this city. As a result they are providing necessary storage facilities and are unloading all cars at present on hand, in order to start in under the new regime without any demurrage assessments being checked up against them.

C. Jones, the manager of the association, says that its rules will become operative July 1 and that they will be observed to the very letter. Every railroad entering Omaha, South Omaha and Council Bluffs is enrolled as members of the association and the Omaha office of the operating and traffic departments hope that the cooperation of freight cars and the frequent shortage, because of dilatory unloading by consignees, will soon be a thing of the past.

### Shippers Notified of New Rules.

The Car Service association has notified all the shippers in the three cities of the rules that will be observed, enclosing the schedule of demurrage charges that will be charged against all shipments which are not removed from freight cars within the limits of time allowed. The demurrage charge that will be collected on the majority of shipments will be \$1 per day beginning forty-eight hours after the receipt of the car. In other words, the consignee will have forty-eight hours after the arrival of the car containing his goods to remove the same. After that time he will be compelled to pay \$1 a day as storage charges.

The Car Service association, said one railroad manager, "is not designed to work a hardship upon any shippers, nor is it expected to be. The plan will be a profitable one for both railroads and shippers. The rules of the Car Service association are sufficiently liberal and there are exceptions which grant the shippers great latitude. For instance, cars loaded with coal are given free truckage for seventy-two hours after arrival and forty-eight hours' unloading time, thus giving coal shippers five days before demurrage charges are assessed against the shipments."

### RAILROAD MAGNATES CONFERRING.

#### Executive Officers of Three Allied Routes Holding a Conference.

Executive officers of the Union Pacific, Oregon Short Line and Oregon Railway & Navigation company met in this city yesterday for the purpose of holding a conference relative to railroad matters, in which the three railroads are mutually concerned because of their closely allied interests. The meeting was held in the private office of President Burt at Union Pacific headquarters. It was attended by President Burt of the Union Pacific, W. D. Corah of New York, vice president of the Union Pacific and the Oregon Short Line, W. H. Bennett, vice president and general manager, S. W. Eccles, general traffic manager, E. E. Calvin, general superintendent, J. F. Dunn, superintendent of motive power, all of the Oregon Short Line at Salt Lake, and B. Campbell of Portland, general traffic manager of the Oregon Railway & Navigation company.

Vice President Corah arrived from New York yesterday. He was accompanied by Mrs. Corah and his private secretary, H. B. Taylor, a young man of the city who came to the attention of Corah during the Philippine campaign. The Salt Lake contingent of the Short Line arrived from the west yesterday. Accompanying the party were Walter Anderson and H. B. Looker of Salt Lake.

### ASSESSMENTS TO BE RAISED

#### Jobbers and Retailers Not Carrying Their Share of Public Burden.

### SO SAY THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

#### Valuation of About One Hundred Firms to Be Increased—No One Offers Any Objection.

The county commissioners, as a board of equalization, have come to the conclusion that the jobbers and large retailers of the city are not carrying their share of the public burden. The commissioners also believe that the South Omaha packing houses are escaping with too slight a tribute and their assessments are likely to be doubled for the ensuing year. If the present plan of radical increase is carried out by the board the decreased returns of the assessors will be offset and there will be a gratifying swelling of the county revenues for next year.

### Excursion Travel is Heavy

#### Railroads Obligated to Run Extra Trains to Handle Business.

The second of the season's eastbound excursions from Colorado points to the east left Denver, Colorado Springs and Pueblo last Saturday and passed through this city Sunday. All of the three railroads competitive for this business had an unusually large patronage as a result of the influenza epidemic. The Rock Island ran a special train, the Union Pacific called into service a large number of extra cars and the Burlington ran its Chicago train out of Denver Saturday afternoon in two sections.

### Freight Train Derailed.

A freight train eastbound on the Rock Island was derailed near South Bend Sunday night. Reports received at the local office of the Burlington, which is the only one sustained by any of the trainmen and passengers, although the debris caused by the derailment promised to delay the operation of passenger trains. To avoid this an arrangement was made with the Burlington whereby the morning and noon trains of the Rock Island were operated between Omaha and Lincoln on the Burlington tracks.
