

EDMISTEN FILES A PROTEST

Objects to the Name Adopted by the Middle-of-the-Road Populists.

FUSIONISTS BEGIN TO WEAKEN A LITTLE

Lofty Indifference to the Independent Movement Gives Way to the Ordinary Course of Partisan Opposition.

LINCOLN, July 23.—(Special.)—Officers of the people's independent state central committee have formally declared war against the populist or middle-of-the-road party and today they fired the first shot in the shape of a protest against allowing any of the candidates of that party to be certificates of nomination in the secretary of state's office.

Chairman Edmisten begins his protest with the assertion that a "certain body of men purporting to hold a convention intended to assume as their party name the political designation 'populist.'" He next informs the secretary of state that this name has customarily and usually been applied to the people's independent party, and that it was adopted at Grand Island for the purpose of confusing and deceiving voters.

Looks Like a Change of Heart. Viewed in the light of their comment concerning the middle-of-the-road movement and the convention at Grand Island and their remarks that the candidates would not receive any votes from the fusion forces, the step taken by the people's independent state committee today may be considered as a little inconsistent. The band of populist state officials and officeholders who returned to Lincoln Saturday after making desperate efforts to "queer" the convention at Grand Island united in saying that the fusion would not injure the cause of fusion in the slightest degree, but, rather, that it would weaken the republican ticket by drawing to it a lot of dissatisfied republican voters.

At the state house the convention at Grand Island continues to be the only topic of conversation. W. B. Price of the auditor's office, in speaking of the cause of fusion in the middle-of-the-roads would poll between 7,000 and 8,000 votes in this state if the election were held today. The movement has considerable strength and we cannot deny it. It is something the fusionists will have to face in the coming campaign.

As to the right of the middle-of-the-roads to a place on the ticket under the name of "populists" opinion among the fusionists is divided. The law provides that no portion of an old party name shall be used by a new party and under this provision the people's independent party has been commonly known as the populist party, but the latter name has never been used on any official state ballot. In defense of the middle-of-the-roads it is claimed that the court cannot take cognizance of any name that does not appear on some official record, that the name "populist" as applied to the people's independent party is similar to the application of the name of an individual and has no place in court in determining the real name of the party.

Text of the Law. Following is the text of the law governing protests against filing certificates on nomination: All certificates of nomination which are in apparent conformity with the provisions of this act shall be deemed to be valid, unless objection thereto shall be duly made in writing within three days after the filing of the same. In case such objection is made, notice of the same shall be mailed to all candidates who may be affected thereby, addressed to them at their respective places of residence, and the certificate of nomination. Objections to use of party name or device may also be made as objections to certificates. The officer with whom the certificate is filed shall file the same with the secretary of state or the order of the judge or supreme court justice revising such decisions shall be binding on all officers of the municipal or other officers with whom certificates of nomination are filed. The action of a division in any party and claims by two or more factions to the same party name or title, or figure or emblem, shall be determined by the preference of names, figure or device to the convention held at the time and place designated in the call of the regularly constituted party authorities, and if the other faction or factions shall present no other party name, title or device the secretary of state shall select a name or title and place the same on the list of candidates of said faction and select some suitable device designating its candidates. The action of the preceding national convention of such party, regularly constituted, shall be binding on the secretary of state or the court in its decision. The secretary of state may be compelled by temporary order of the district court to perform his duty in this regard.

Incendary Again at Work. WEST POINT, Neb., July 23.—(Special.)—The incendiary, whose efforts to destroy the town have been so far fruitless, made another attempt early this morning to fire the rear of a frame dwelling house on South Main street, occupied by a widow woman and her family, who were sleeping in the building at the time. The fire was extinguished without much trouble. This is the first attempt to fire a building where human beings were placed in danger, the attempts heretofore having been mostly confined to warehouses, barns, sheds and disused buildings of that character. There is no clue to the perpetrator.

Boy is Killed by Train. COLUMBUS, NEB., July 23.—(Special Telegram.)—Frank, the 10-year-old son of Ludwig Ignatzky, was instantly killed last night on the Norfolk branch of the Union Pacific. The boy was being accompanied by his father and a neighbor. The train was passing through a curve when the boy was struck and his arms and legs were broken and his skull crushed. Coroner

PAYNE IS NAMED SECRETARY

Omaha Man is to Succeed Fitzgerald on the State Barbers' Board.

LINCOLN, Neb., July 23.—(Special Telegram.)—M. Payne of Omaha was elected secretary of the State Barbers' Board, to succeed D. J. Fitzgerald, resigned. Fitzgerald stated his reason for resigning was that he could not devote the required time to the position. The decision of the district court at Auburn and the attitude of several courts of attorneys in declaring the barbers' law unconstitutional have left the board without any revenue and this is believed to be the real cause of the resignations of Fitzgerald and Casbeer within the last few weeks.

MOISTURE FOR NEBRASKA CROPS. General Rain Throughout State. BEYERLY, Neb., July 23.—(Special Telegram.)—A slow, drizzling rain has been falling here the greater portion of the day and gives promise of continuing indefinitely.

PLATTSMOUTH, Neb., July 23.—(Special Telegram.)—A fine rain visited this locality today and was of much benefit to the corn crop and the pastures.

WEST POINT, Neb., July 23.—(Special.)—Rain is now falling in this section. Harvest is practically over, all the small grain being cut and ready for stacking, which will be retarded by the rains. Corn is now a sure crop, sufficient moisture having now fallen to carry it beyond the danger point. The prospect is good for a very heavy yield of this staple product.
