Omaha Hunters Join Nebraska Fish and Game Protective Association.

POT HUNTING MUST BE DONE AWAY WITH

Committee Appointed to Investigate Reports of Illegal Shooting and Start Prosecutions Against Lawbreakers.

Forty-one of Omaha's sportsmen added their names last night to the membership of the Nebraska Fish and Game Protective Association recently organized at Lincoln.

Object of Association Explained. J. H. Ager, president of the Nebraska Fish and Game Protective Association, explained the object of the association and set forth the necessity of uniting and prompt action in putting a stop to the unlawful shooting of game birds.

After this meeting resolved itself into a business session of the association. The resignation of John T. Dorgan as secretary-treasurer was accepted and Charles Johannes of Omaha elected in his stead.

Short address setting forth the necessity of immediate action and indicating the widespread prevalence of illegal shooting were made by Edgar Howard of Papillion, A. W. Jeffers, Charles Johannes, G. F. Brucker, W. W. Bingham and W. P. MacFarlane.

STORY OF ASSASSIN'S LIFE

Some Facts Concerning the Career of the Italian Regicide.

EXACT INCIDENTS OF THE MURDER

King was Happy Over the Thought that His Subjects Loved Him When the Bullets Pierced His Body.

(Copyright, 1900, by Press Publishing Co.) FLORENCE, July 31.—(New York World Cablegram—Special Telegram)—I have just returned from Prato, where I obtained for the World the first authentic detailed account of Regicide Bressi's antecedents and movements prior to the assassination of Humbert.

Gaetano Bressi was born at Cosano, a mile from Prato, a manufacturing town of 15,000 inhabitants, beautifully situated fifteen miles north of Florence, November 10, 1869. He was formerly a shoemaker and straggler at the technical school at Prato, when he became a weaver, which vocation he followed eight years at Fabrice's, a large factory in Prato. After the strike in 1892 he left and took work at the Unimis factories in Florence. One year later he returned to Prato, where he engaged at Zelli's mill. He was of restless roving disposition, for he left again for Lucca on the 23d of January, 1898, and sailed from Genoa for New York on February 28 of the same year. He returned to Prato June 4, last, and the Italian consul at New York advised the authorities that he had returned himself in an anarchist journal published at Paterson, N. J., edited by Giacomelli and Malatesta, revolutionary Italians. He traveled from New York via Paris and June 14 he applied to the municipality at Prato for a birth certificate to secure a permit to carry arms, but was refused owing to his character and past offenses committed against the municipality. June 16 he secured a passport for New York, describing himself as a shoemaker. At the beginning of July he went to Castel San Pietro to visit two young nieces and on the evening of the 18th he took a train for Milan via Biogno.

Bressi is tall and slender, olive complexioned, with dark eyes and a light mustache. His mother died in February, 1891, and his father in 1895. He has two brothers, one Lorenzo, a shoemaker at Cosano, thirteen years older, and the other Angelo, for whom the murderer appears first to have been mistaken, eighteen years older, a lieutenant of artillery, stationed at Caserta. Lorenzo Bressi, in an interview at Cosano, said: "I knew of Gaetano's anarchistic opinions, but never attached any importance to them and always thought him a quiet, good natured fellow. He was run out of Italy, where he had stayed would have been to have starved. We have come here. Things are no better here. We are treated like dogs in the mills. We are not considered human by Americans. We do not get paid for the work we do. We are starved. It is neglect. Who is responsible for this government? We will try to better it by fair means, and if we can't succeed then we will resort to other methods."

NEW YORK, July 31.—(Special Telegram)—The Italian consul went to Hoboken today to see the woman who says she is the wife of Bressi, the assassin of King Humbert. The object of the visit was to obtain information concerning the man for the use of the Italian authorities in prosecuting the murderer.

Mrs. Bressi, whose maiden name was Jennie O'Neil, lived in Chicago before coming east to Hoboken, where she met Bressi. Mrs. Bressi was closely questioned by a representative of the Italian consulate and the police in the same story regarding her husband that she had given to the reporters. The police searched the house, but found no evidence to show that either the woman or her husband was connected with a plot for the assassination of King Humbert.

It is stated that Mrs. Bressi will be kept under surveillance. The consul general in this city is to communicate with the Hoboken police in case the woman is needed by the Italian authorities as a witness.

Hopes for Peace with Papacy. BERLIN, July 31.—The Chinese situation has rather fallen into the background in consequence of the death of King Humbert and the duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha and the papers are filled with matter regarding the deceased.

The press all comments on the situation and the Germania (ultramontane) expresses the hope that the Italian dynasty will now make peace with the papacy, inasmuch as anarchism is best fought by religion.

When the Shot Was Fired. MILAN, July 30.—Delayed in transmission.—(New York World Cablegram—Special Telegram)—The king left the royal villa at 9, arriving at the field where the private were held an hour later, dressed as a Quinto. Arriving at the entrance to the palace, he was greeted by the king's secretary and after congratulating the victors, he took his seat in the carriage to return to the palace. The carriage had scarcely moved and was still surrounded by a crowd of youths making loud and loyal demonstrations. The king responded, "Thank you, thank you, gentlemen," when in an instant he heard three sharp reports. The horses dashed forward, leaving the crowd in ignorance of the result, but maddened by fear for the sovereign. The wildest disorder prevailed, all trying to lay hold of the murderer, shouting and screams filled the air. Carabineers, mounted on horseback, dashed forward, leaving the crowd in ignorance of the result, but maddened by fear for the sovereign.

After the shots he fell forward, but was prevented from tumbling from the open carriage by his aide de camp, Count Avogadro di Quirino. Arriving at the entrance to the palace the king, by a superb effort, raised his body to an upright position and expired.

Absolutely the last words spoken by the king were addressed to General Ponze Valiga and were: "It is a long time since I have felt such cordial sympathy from my people as I have felt today." Two seconds later he was silent.

The weapon, a small caliber revolver, was found near the spot with three chambers loaded. When the landau arrived at the villa it was immediately surrounded by members of the court and the king was borne by loving hands up a broad flight of steps and placed on a bed. His eyes were yet open, but he gave no sign of life. The queen, magnificently gowned in white, threw herself on the body of her husband, crying piteously, saying again and again: "What a crime and to such a man, who never did evil to any one. Save him for me, for pity's sake!" Examination of the body showed three shots had taken effect in the neck, in the chest and through the heart.

Visit to the Assassin. In a cell on the ground floor of the prison I saw Bressi, a Tuscan of 31 years, on the morning after the crime at 2 o'clock, calmly awaiting morning. He is a man of more than medium stature, with black, curly hair and mustache, unusually black and deep-set eyes and regular features. He was cool, calm and indifferent. Being questioned, he answered, through tightly closed lips: "I returned from America and came back to Italy and joined the 'Internationale' at Prato. The motive for the killing is said to have been financial difficulties."

Christian Church Convention. MARYVILLE, Mo., July 31.—(Special Telegram)—The annual convention of the Christian Church of the West was held at Barnard yesterday and today. The following officers were elected: President, Rev. F. E. Blanchard, Barnard; secretary and treasurer, Rev. N. R. Davis. The sum for the year was \$1,000. The district of the West was raised. It was decided that the next meeting shall be held at Hopkins in the fall. The meeting was the best ever held. Delegates from every church in the county were present. Papers and reports formed an interesting part of the program.

POWERS MAKES FULL DENIAL

Defendant in Goebel Case Resumes Stand in His Own Behalf.

DECLARES GOLDEN'S TESTIMONY FALSE

Witness Details Events Preceding His Arrest and Says Fear of Late Trial Was Only Motive for Flight.

RABID ANARCHIST SPEECH

Companions at Paterson Endorse the Action of the Italian Regicide.

NEW YORK, July 31.—There was a meeting of anarchists in Paterson, N. J., last night at which the killing of King Humbert was endorsed. A reporter who sought admittance was welcomed, as it was said that these anarchists wanted the whole world to know the sentiments.

Let Nicholas of Russia tremble and let the new king of Italy prepare for death. They are both inhuman. They are inhuman because they are monarchs. They would consent to the slaughter of their own throats were they not inhuman. It is a republic that we want and it is a republic that the anarchists in every country will have.

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NEW YORK, July 31.—The direct testimony of ex-Secretary of State Caleb Powers, as a witness in his own behalf, was not concluded until 3 o'clock this afternoon and the cross-examination, which will take up at least all of tomorrow, had proceeded only a short way when court adjourned. Tomorrow will be the third day Powers has been on the stand.

The witness said that on the morning of the assassination he was preparing to go to Louisville to make arrangements for bringing more people to Frankfort. He locked his office door, as described by Witness Golden. He had no recollection of anything being said concerning suspicious actions which Golden had referred to and was certain nothing of this sort was said. At La Grange the party heard that Goebel had been assassinated and that the shot had been fired from the second or third story of the executive building.

The witness said that the statement of Golden that he spoke derisively when told of the shooting was absolutely false. "I did not say that," he continued, "to return to Frankfort as soon as possible and did so that afternoon. I went to the executive building and with my key—the only one I ever had to the office—unlocked the door. I found the lock had been battered and had difficulty in withdrawing the key. I did not take the lock and supplement it with a new one, as has been stated by the prosecution. J. B. Mathews put on the new lock."

The witness said he never heard any sort of violence talked of in any of the many conferences in which he participated, except in one in the commissioner of agriculture's office, in which Sheriff Burton of Breckinridge county talked in an incendiary manner and was rebuffed by the witness.

Powers Begins Investigation. The day after the assassination witness said he began an investigation to learn where the shot was fired from. The newspapers were full of talk about the shooting of Goebel from his office. He employed J. B. Mathews and Detective Griffin of Somerset to assist in the investigation.

"I made no statement to Golden that I was satisfied the shot came from my office and did not tell him I was thinking of going to the commonwealth attorney's office. I did not have a talk with Governor Bradley about going to see Frankfort, but he advised against it and I did not go."

Powers then detailed the events immediately preceding the arrest of himself and Capt. Daney. He said he believed it was Judge Yost, advised him to make his way to the mountains and remain there till public excitement died out before giving himself up for trial.

The legislature had appropriated \$100,000 for the prosecution of prisoners charged with crime and he believed it was possible for men to get a fair trial in Franklin county. Moreover, it did not believe the civil authorities there could protect me and I did not know that I could get change of venue. These were the reasons that suggested flight from Frankfort."

At the afternoon session Powers resumed the stand. In regard to the guns in his office, which McKenzie Todd, Governor Taylor's private secretary, referred to in the how they came there, he understood that one or two of them were left there at the end of Governor Bradley's administration. Witness said he wrote a letter to Prof. Stevens of Barbourville, on February 10, saying in substance: "The present demoralized condition of the democratic party is due to me more than to any other man in the state. They know I am in favor of an open war."

Expensive Leak in Dry Dock. NEW YORK, July 31.—Dry dock No. 2 at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, which was repaired at an estimated expenditure of \$1,000, sprang a leak today, which flooded the dock with water in the dry dock, covering all the tools and machinery used in the work of reconstruction. The leak was caused by the removal of the caisson from the mouth of dry dock No. 2, situated alongside No. 2, and the water filled No. 2.

The witness received a letter which he said he received from Robert Noakes in March. In the letter he says Noakes offered his services as a witness, saying he would disprove the charges made against the witness made by Wharton Golden, whose confession was given great attention by the newspapers at that time. In the letter Noakes says he heard Golden say that "Powers and Finley did not want anybody except Little Methodist preachers to go on the mountain excursion to Frankfort," and this was offered by Noakes as evidence to offset Golden's charge that Powers told him to "get up a crowd of regular mountain feudists."

The direct examination was concluded at 2:50. At the close the lawyers for the defense held a short consultation. When this was finished the cross-examination was begun. Colonel Campbell conducted the cross-examination. He asked the witness: "You have stated that the men you brought to Frankfort January 25 were sober, good citizens and did not contain any mountain feudists. Do you know Joseph Adkins, who is reputed to have killed a half dozen men?"

RURAL FREE DELIVERY ROUTES

Additional Routes to Be Established During the Year in Nebraska and Adjoining States.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—(Special Telegram)—Superintendent Machen of the free delivery service has completed a list of places in various states where rural free delivery will be established during the current fiscal year. Thirty additional routes, but probably more, will be established in Nebraska. There are twenty-two routes in operation, and in South Dakota it is proposed to establish two additional routes, seven now being in operation. There are difficulties in the way of the extension of the service into Iowa, and other western states. Farms are so immense, requiring so much travel on the part of the carrier that it is not possible to service in the United States. With the funds now available, it is possible for the service to be established in Iowa, although, as stated, an additional number will be established in the near future.

That rural free delivery service is gaining tremendously in popularity is shown by the fact that the department of agriculture has decided to establish 3,000 additional routes, which will make the total number of routes in operation in the United States, it is estimated by the officials that by July, 1901, it will have increased to 10,000. The service which will be in operation at that time. According to these figures, the service will be carried upon at its next session for an appropriation of about \$9,999,999 for rural free delivery.
