

OMAHA NOT ON THEIR LISTS

Football Managers Refuse to Play Any Games Here This Season.

GLOOMY OUTLOOK FOR THANKSGIVING

Lincoln Will Be Favored With Number of Contests, Among Which Will Be One With Minnesota.

Omaha will receive very cold treatment this year at the hands of the college football players. The Thanksgiving game, the event of magnitude of the collegiate year, has invariably taken place in this city or on occasion, in the city of Lincoln, but in 1900 the metropolis will be cut off the list. It is possible that the game with Grinnell will occur in Omaha in the middle of the week, though there is an equal chance of its going to Lincoln.

The foot ball managers are discouraged about Omaha. They say that no college team ever profited a penny by its visit to the city and that the International tournament to play even. It was pointed out that the weather was largely responsible, Thanksgiving having had an almost invariable accompaniment of a blizzard during the last few years. This palliating point was admitted, but the long-haired ones complained on the other hand that Omaha oughtn't to have such weather. In other cities, it is pointed out, the sun made a practice of shining. On the only occasion when the 'varsity did hope to have a margin to the good—the game at Council Bluffs—the process was set by attachment of windings and still litigation. So Omaha will be disciplined with an interval of quiet.

The great event of the year will be held at Lincoln on Thanksgiving when the University of Minnesota will face the Nebraska team in the first time this year. For years the Lincoln managers have tried in vain to bring off such a game with no success. Minnesota is naturally looked upon as large game and the cornhuskers will bend every nerve to their undoing. A contest on such a scale in Lincoln is looked upon as something of an experiment, as there is no means of knowing how generally the citizens will turn out to support their favorite. The college atmosphere is so distinct in the town however, that the management feels considerable confidence in its judgment. One important item in the new arrangement is the decreased expense, the Nebraska being on their own ground and so escaping altogether the burden of hotel and railroad bills.

Schedule of Games.

The first game on Manager Tukey's schedule will be the regular contest with the alumni, September 29, on the Lincoln campus. Billy Hayward, Billy Wilson and other veterans will face the 'varsity and will doubtless perpetuate the glory of the old days when Flippin and Oury and all the rest pulled the scarlet and cream higher than any other rag in the state. For the first time since one of its players was killed in a scrimmage at Kansas City several years ago, Doane college will take an active interest in foot ball. A game is scheduled with Doane at Lincoln on October 6. Doane was once the champion of the state and defeated the State university without any exceptional exertion.

For the week of October 6 Manager Tukey has a proposal from the University of South Dakota at Vermillion, the game to be played at Sioux City during the carnival. On October 12 the 'varsity will meet the Iowa Agricultural college, the game to be played on Lincoln ground.
