

SLANDERERS ARE REBUKED

Hastings Citizens Openly Assert Their Confidence in Fellow Townsman.

DIETRICH ENDORSED BY HIS NEIGHBORS

People, Irrespective of Politics, Are Incensed and Indignant Over Cruel Falsehoods Circulated by Fusionists.

IT IS A DEMOCRATIC PAPER

Main Reason Why the Majority of Patrons of the Lincoln Freepress Support Bryan.

LINCOLN, Oct. 30.—(Special Telegram.)

Republicans here do not attach any political significance to the report printed in fusion newspapers that a poll of the subscribers of the Freepress, a German newspaper printed here, showed an overwhelming sentiment in favor of Bryan's election. The paper declared for Bryan at the beginning of the campaign last year and for many months has been considered a democratic paper, although it claims to be independent. When this is considered it is not at all surprising that a majority of its subscribers are for Bryan.

To correct a misinterpretation of one of his recent decisions relative to the assessment of members of mutual fire insurance companies, written by a fusion newspaper, was made public today. In it he declares that he meant that mutual companies chartered under the law of 1857 could not fix the rate of assessment and, further, that he did not refer to the companies organized under the law of 1873. Many policyholders of the three companies chartered under the old law concluded from the auditor's decision that he meant to include all mutual companies. An officer in one of the old companies said the false impression formed from the auditor's decision injured their business, causing the dissolution of a large number of contracts.

Dr. Jacob Good Schurman spoke from a nonpolitical standpoint on the Philippine problems before the students of the University of Nebraska in the chapel this morning. He said the Philippines are capable of being educated and that they looked to the Americans for enlightenment. Although nonpartisan, Dr. Schurman took only one view of the situation, asserting that the duty of the American people is clear and should be indisputable.

NEBRASKA CITY, Oct. 30.—(Special.)—When shown a telegram that Grover Cleveland had written to Don Dickinson reaffirming the news he expressed in his speech of April 27, 1897, arraigning Bryanism and authorizing Dickinson to make any use of the letter he sees fit, ex-Secretary J. Sterling Morton said:

I have often wondered who the friends of Grover Cleveland, who know his patriotism and courage, and who know his high character, his choice between Bryanism and reputation on the one hand and a stable, honest currency on the other. Cleveland was a patriot. He was not a politician. He was not a party man. He was not a man who would sacrifice his principles for a moment. He was a man who would stand for his principles to the end.

BODY FOUND IN THE RUINS

Remains of Human Being Discovered in Debris of Burned Building.

AFFAIR NEAR BASSETT IS A MYSTERY

No Clue is Had as to the Cause of the Fire or Who the Man Was Whose Charred Form Was in the Ashes.

BASSETT, Neb., Oct. 30.—(Special Telegram.)—A vacant farmhouse in the western part of this county was burned last night and this morning the charred remains of a human body were found in the ruins. The coroner was notified and an inquest was held at a middle-aged man. The building was burned in the afternoon of the night, but there is no clue to the cause of the fire nor the identity of the person burned.

FUSION FAKERS ARE BUSY

Perpetrating in Undertaking to Frighten Foreigners with Their Military Bugaboo.

O'NEILL, Neb., Oct. 30.—(Special Telegram.)—Populism must be on its last legs in this section, when the leaders have to resort to falsehood and deception to further their cause. John K. Tomask of school district No. 69, who lives in Holt county, states that on October 29, two men came to his place and requested that he give them the names of all the boys in his school district, between the ages of 15 and 30 years. He gave them the names of about seven boys and after they had taken down the names Mr. Tomask asked them what was wanted with the names of those boys. They told him that if Mr. Tomask was elected, the government intended to send 10,000 soldiers over to the Philippine islands to put down the war there quick, and they wanted the names of the boys to go as soldiers. They pretended that they represented the republicans and the government, and asked him to say nothing to any populist in the community.

People Are Indignant

Methods of Campaigning Used by Dietrich's Opponents Condemned by Hastings Citizens.

HASTINGS, Neb., Oct. 30.—(Special.)—When Rev. Kirschstein was informed what had appeared in Sunday's World-Herald purporting to be an interview with the painters of Hastings and that his name was in the list that was opposed to Dietrich, he was greatly surprised and denied most emphatically that he had been interviewed, but that he had said that he would or would not vote for Mr. Dietrich. Rev. Kirschstein said that if there was any statement made in regard to politics in which he was quoted or his name appeared in it in any way it was absolutely false and without a grain of truth in it. He further said that he did not intend it just for people to be so carried away with their party politics that they stop at nothing in their efforts to tear down and destroy a candidate's reputation for no other reason than that their choice candidate may win.

YANKTON, S. D., Oct. 30.—(Special Telegram.)—The news of the death of Mrs. Gray, wife of Rev. W. B. D. Gray at Chesapeake, Wyo., of paralysis has been received here. Mr. Gray was the Congregational Sunday school superintendent of Wyoming, which position he long held in this state. The deceased was known and loved in all parts of the state. The body will be brought to Yankton for interment.
