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WELCOME KANSAS ROAD

Promoters of Proposed Line Find Encouragement at Mass Meeting.

VOTE FAVORABLE TO BOND ISSUE

Matter is Left to a Committee of Five, With Instructions to Get a More Definite Proposition from the Promoters.

At a mass meeting in the Commercial club rooms last night the question of voting bonds to aid the construction of the proposed Kansas Southern road into Omaha was discussed in an amicable manner...

Charles H. Picken, president of the club, called the meeting to order and asked Euclid Martin to preside. Mr. Martin introduced Charles S. Wheeler, president of the proposed road, who gave his reasons for wanting to build into Omaha.

In the nine miles of road the company has invested \$100,000 and has made provision for \$300,000 more to build an additional thirty-four miles to connect with the Union Pacific and Santa Fe roads.

"We are prepared to build a line from Omaha to Emporia," said the speaker, "at a cost of about \$2,000,000, provided we receive the encouragement to which we are entitled and where all new roads are met with no opposition from the roads whose lines we cross."

"We can offer you the cattle shippers of the southwest and a road to the Gulf. It is entirely an inland route and will remain so. At Emporia we tap three roads which do not enter Omaha directly, and we know we can make satisfactory traffic arrangements with the Memphis, Kansas & Texas line."

This is not a scheme to get a franchise or subsidy to pass upon the market, but we mean to build the road.

Terminal Facilities for Omaha. The speaker then took up the question of bonus. He finds it with an expensive matter to secure terminal facilities in Omaha. He then made a definite proposition as follows:

Our proposition was to ask \$250,000 and terminal facilities estimated to cost an equal amount. Now the terms are changed so that in addition to the issue of \$250,000, a terminal company is to be formed with a capital stock of \$500,000, one-half to be supplied by the Kansas Southern company and one-half by the citizens of Omaha.

When he had finished, Euclid Martin said he thought the building of the road would be a good thing, but the question is now whether the city is in a position to vote bonds. He thought the matter should be discussed and some conclusion reached at this meeting.

W. C. COFFIN IS BANKRUPT

Schedules Millions as Liabilities, but Little as Assets.

USED TO SERVE NEBRASKA TOWNS Was Member of Firm of Stanton & Coffin, Formerly Much in Touch with Hastings and Nebraska City.

NEW YORK, April 12.—William E. Coffin of this city, who was a former partner in the banking house of Coffin & Stanton, which made a general assignment in 1894, filed petition in bankruptcy in the United States district court today.

The debts are all old ones, having been contracted by the firm in its usual transactions of a banking house business prior to the assignment in 1894.

The petition is filed by Mr. Coffin through his counsel, Boardman, Platt & Seelye. C. L. Kinsley of this firm said today that the liabilities were all from the Coffin & Stanton days and that no new liabilities had been contracted by William Edward Coffin since then.
