

TO GET RID OF DOLE

Hawaiian Territorial Legislature Asks that Governor Be Removed.

URGENT MEMORIAL TO THE PRESIDENT

One of the Problems Facing McKinley When He Gets Back.

DOLE DENOUNCED AS HOSTILE TO ISLANDS

House Rules Declare He Obstructs Their Needed Legislation.

WONT GIVE LEGISLATURE EXTRA SESSION

Governor Defends His Attitude by Charges of Bribery and Circuit Judge Wants Grand Jury to Investigate.

HONOLULU, May 4.—(Via San Francisco, May 10.)—The first territorial legislature of Hawaii came to an end the evening of April 26, according to Governor Dole, and on the new night, according to the majority of both houses.

The legislature ended its existence at loggheads with the governor all along the line, and without having passed a single law of importance.

The president is asked in the resolution to use his influence in behalf of an extra session of the legislature to transact general legislation which Dole refuses to grant.

The Hawaiians claim they have not had time in which to work out the plans of lawmaking they had formed in the thirty days of the regular session.

In conclusion the home rulers ask that Dole be removed, and the committee on the other way to bring about an extra session of the territorial legislature, declaring that the governor has acted in such a manner as to lose the confidence of a majority of the people of the territory, and that Dole be removed.

The concurrent resolution passed through both houses by large majorities, all the native home rule members voting for it.

Both houses passed a resolution demanding proof. In reply the governor stated that general charges of bribery had been made in the local papers and on the floor of the senate, but had not been investigated.

The governor has issued a proclamation calling for an extra session for appropriation bills only to begin May 8.

Circuit Judge Humphreys is about to call a special grand jury to investigate the charges of bribery in the legislature.

CHANGES FREIGHT RATING

Western Classification Committee Finishes Work on Its Work Before Adjourning.

DEL MONTE, Cal., May 10.—The Western Classification committee closed its session here today. Action was deferred on the matter of advance in the present rating on mixed carloads and ratings based on released valuations.

The committee passed a resolution providing that shipments in wood pump boxes should take the same rating as on crated articles. Combination wood and wire fence was reduced to the fourth class in less than carloads and mixed car ratings was established on wood pumps and tubing.

NO SPECIAL DISPENSATIONS

Woodmen of the World Law Committee Will Recommend that They Be Not Granted.

COLUMBUS, O., May 10.—The law committee of the sovereign camp, Woodmen of the World, today decided to recommend to the convention here next week a resolution providing that no special dispensations be granted hereafter by local camps to work the reinstatement of suspended members.

MORGAN RUSHES TO CABLE

After Night He Starts All Office Directors in Chicago.

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PARIS, May 10.—(New York World Cablegram—Special Telegram.)—J. P. Morgan, who left for Paris on Friday, immediately after an interview with Andrew Carnegie, rushed back here, arriving here this morning, having remained away less than a week, instead of three weeks as he had intended to do.

A bunch of fifty dispatches was handed to Mr. Morgan just then. He put them all in his bag, and went to the great party which was being given at the Waldorf-Astoria.

Mr. Morgan evidently was worried and somewhat excited, as after a sleepless night he remained the whole day in his private study, and did not go out to the party.

At 6:30 p. m. Mr. Morgan had not returned to his hotel at 10 p. m. Then he took luncheon and went out again alone. He had not returned to his hotel at 10 p. m. Twenty thick cable messages awaited him at that hour.

RUSSIA IS OPTIMISTIC

WILL HURRY FRUIT THROUGH

California Shippers Receive Promise of More Cars and Faster Time to the East.

CHICAGO, May 10.—An understanding has been reached between the fruit shippers of Southern California and the Santa Fe and Southern Pacific roads which will expedite another car famine during the fruit shipping season and insure quicker service. Although no contract has been entered into the shippers have been assured that ample transportation facilities will be provided in the future for moving the orange and lemon crops.

PRIESTS CONDUCT A MYSTERY

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EXPLOSION AT HOMESTEAD
