DAYLIGHT PARADE TO BE HELD WEDNESDAY

Fifty-Ton Whale Captured at Mouth of Mississippi River to Be Exhibited on the Streets During Parade.

The grand daylight parade to be given Wednesday afternoon under the auspices of the Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben promises to be one of the red-letter events in connection with the fall festivities.

Immense Team to Be Used. The whale weighs fifty tons and is fifty feet long, and is said to be a mean spouter when angered. He will be placed in the parade in a specially constructed wagon drawn by forty-eight horses.

CONCESSION TO JEWS

see who will derive benefit from the supposed extension, or, indeed, whether any extension is intended Jews who possess a liberal higher education (presumably graduates) are not very numerous, seeing that for about fifteen years no university or high school has been allowed to have more than a per cent of Jewish students, and seeing that lately many of those centers of learning have been closed as suspected of revolutionary tendencies.

There is a grim irony in this last concession, for if the Jewish soldiers survive this terrible war they must serve until the close of the campaign, and if they perish the ukase will not be of great service to them. Jewish merchants of the first and second guild are to have the right of visiting all towns for business as long as they do not stay more than three months in any one place.

Nullifies All Concessions. The last paragraph of the ukase is a thorough specimen of Russian law-giving, for it renders nugatory all that precedes it. It seems to have been added by some official who thought the concessions in the body of the ukase dangerously liberal; for it legalizes and maintains in force all orders heretofore made by the central courts which prevented the free movement of the Jews, even should they have been issued illegally. In other words, the new ukase is to be without prejudice to old and illegal decisions of the tribunals. Moreover, as the new regulations do not apply to districts in which special regulations exist for the circumvention of Jews, that is, for the prevention of their free movement, this last paragraph means that the Jews for whose benefit the ukase is made are still to be subject to all the vexatious rules, exactions and extortions of the local police.

Boers Adopt Waiting Plan. Former Rulers of South African Republic Wait for Government to Act.

JOHANNESBURG, Oct. 1.—(Special Cablegram to The Bee.)—The Boers emphatically deny that there has been any "trek" of Boers to any place. Deep resentment is felt in Boer circles at the statement made by Major Leggett, director of the Burgher Land Settlement, to the deputation of indigent Boers, that their leaders are responsible for their poverty and have spent the greater portion of the continental funds for unauthorized purposes.

The ex-general points to the balance sheet published and repeats his denial that the money sent from Europe was for future political purposes. The Boers are still determined to hold aloof until a representative government scheme is published and organization is proceeding through the medium of subcommittees in every district. Meanwhile, they are pressing the government to distribute the £2,000,000 owing, as dissatisfaction is bound to follow unless this is done.

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
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7000 Miles in 70 Days
