DAKOTA CITY, Neb., Aug. 17.—(Special.)—The twenty-fourth annual reunion of the Pioneers and Old Settlers' association and the semi-centennial celebration of the first settlement of Dakota county, will be celebrated in Clinton park, adjoining this place, on Thursday, August 18. The exercises will open with music at 10:30 a. m. by Reed's Fourth Regiment band of Sioux City, which will furnish music throughout the day, with dance music in the evening. The chaplain of the day will be Rev. J. W. Fritzel, D. D., pastor of the Episcopal national church, Sioux City, and the annual address will be delivered by Rev. L. P. Ludden, D. D., of Lincoln. President Augustus T. Haase, who since June 26, 1858, has been a continuous resident of this place, will deliver the president's address, which completes the morning program. CASE TO TEST PRIMARY LAW

Socialist Candidate Files Original Action in Supreme Court.

DRUGS SMUGGLED INTO PENITENTIARY. A. H. Gould, Bankwrecker, Accused by Fellow Convict of Selling it to Him—Cost for Nebraska Soldiers.

LINCOLN, Aug. 17.—(Special.)—Without permission of the court an original action was started in the supreme court this morning which will settle the constitutionality of the Douglas county primary election law which was enacted by the legislature. Clark Adair, nominated by the socialists of Douglas county for county clerk, through his attorneys, Leigh & Magney, filed a petition for a mandamus to compel County Judge Dezel to place his name upon the official ballot, the county clerk having refused to do so because Adair was nominated by a convention instead of by a primary, in accordance with the provisions of the primary election law. Just what the case will be taken up by the judges no one seems to know, as all of them are out of the state at this time. It is understood that County Attorney Schlaugh will file a demurrer to the petition and both sides will then prepare briefs to be presented to the judges upon their return to the state. Before any original action can be filed in the supreme court permission must be secured by the parties from the judges, but owing to the importance of the case and the desire of the parties for a decision in the matter the clerk put the case on the docket.

The petition attacks the constitutionality of the law in the following particulars:

That it violates section 22 of article 1 of the constitution which provides that elections shall be free and there shall be no hindrance or impediment to the right of a qualified voter to exercise his franchise; that the law requires all candidates for nominations to pay the county treasurer 1 per cent of their salary attached to the office to which he aspires before he can be voted for; that it requires any person, if his vote is challenged, to state what party he is affiliated with at the last election and if he is not affiliated with any party it provides that no candidate can get on the ballot unless he has a majority of the votes of the party which he represents; that it amulates cast 1 per cent of the total vote at the last election, in the state, county or subdivision, in which he has been elected. No person can be upon the ballot as the candidate of more than one political
