DINNER FOR PRINCE LOUIS

President Entertains Visiting British Admiral at White House. STAG LUNCHEON BY GENERAL CHAFFEE. In the afternoon the distinguished guest was taken to Fort Myer, where he witnessed cavalry drill. WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—Rear Admiral Prince Louis was the guest of the American army today. Tonight he was the guest at a formal state dinner in the state dining room of the White House, where the president had a distinguished company to meet Britain's admiral-prince. The health of the sovereign relative of the prince, King Edward, was proposed by the president. Although Prince Louis was still the center of a brilliant assemblage at the British embassy ball when midnight of Friday arrived, he breakfasted about 8 this morning at the embassy and promptly at 10 o'clock started for a ride around the city in a sixty-horsepower automobile with Sir Mortimer Durand and Rear Admiral Evans. The capitol, the congressional library, the Washington monument and other places of interest were visited, the prince frequently expressing himself as enthusiastic about the beauty of the American capital. Luncheon by General Chaffee. In the open landau of the embassy, surrounded by bicycle policemen, Prince Louis and his personal staff, at a few minutes before 1 o'clock, drove rapidly to the New Willard, where he was the guest of Lieutenant General Chaffee, chief of staff, at a stag luncheon. The guests numbered sixty, including members of the president's cabinet, Assistant Secretary Bacon, the acting secretary of war, and ranking officers of the general staff. When cigars had been passed, Lieutenant General Chaffee introduced Secretary Root, who in a few graceful words proposed the health of the president and the king. As the first health was drunk the band played "The Star Spangled Banner." The American anthem was merged into "God Save

Excursion Train Struck

Nineteen People Injured When Southern Pacific Limited Smashes Car. IOWA FURNISHES MOST OF THE VICTIMS. Accident Near San Luis Obispo, California, May Result in Death of Woman and Child from Ottumwa. SAN LUIS OBISPO, Cal., Nov. 4.—The Southern Pacific southbound coast line limited passenger train dashed into a train of tourist cars at Santa Margarita station, fourteen miles north of this city, yesterday. The tourist train was standing on the main line in the yards at Santa Margarita, when the engine of the limited dashed into the rear end, plowing its way through one of the cars. Nineteen people were hurt, seven of them seriously and two probably fatally. Elsie Blackmore, a girl of 9 years, was pinned down in the wreckage. Her right arm was twisted out of shape and the bones were crushed. She also received internal injuries, which may prove fatal. Mrs. M. P. Martin of Ottumwa, Ia., is also in a condition which is considered serious. The injured are: Mrs. M. W. Glass, Maryville, Mo., cut on head, arms twisted and bruised. Mrs. S. A. Glass, Ontario, Cal., left arm broken, badly bruised. Ottumwa, Ia., chest crushed, unconscious, seriously hurt. Grace Martin, Ottumwa, Ia., badly bruised on the body. E. H. Isaac, Fon Du Lac, Wis., right arm badly sprained and twisted. Edward Egan, Clinton, Ia., right foot and leg severely cut and bruised. Roy Eshman, Holsington, Kan., sprained ankle. D. C. Mattison, Berwyn, Ill., flesh on left leg severely cut and bruised. Mrs. D. C. Mattison, Berwyn, Ill., chest injured and thigh wrenched. Horace and George Mattison, badly cut and bruised about face and head. Katherine Crego, Chicago, back and spine injured. Elsie Blackmore, Ottumwa, Ia., arm broken and twisted from socket. Nellie Marie David City, Neb., arm broken and spine hurt. Lillian Schneider, St. Louis, bruised. AWFUL CRIME OF A WOMAN Kills Two Children, Wounds Two Others and Inflicts Injuries on Herself. MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 4.—Mrs. James Brennan of this city quarreled with her husband last evening and after he had gone to work attempted to kill his four children and herself. She shot and killed two of the children and wounded the other two, so that neither is expected to recover. She turned the revolver on herself and received a bullet in the left breast, which, it is believed, will result in death. Mrs. Brennan is the second wife of Mr. Brennan and is the step-mother of the children. She and her husband have frequently had trouble about the children. The shooting occurred about 1:30 a. m. The dead are: Lizzie, aged 15, shot through the temple; Alice, aged 8, shot back of the right ear. The boys, Thomas, aged 13, and Arthur, aged 11, were shot in the head. They and

Finland Gains Freedom

Czar of Russia Grants All Demands of Delegates of People. WILL TRY TO HOLD DUCHY IN EMPIRE. Warships Off Helsinki to Show that While Granting Constitution Russia Does Not Resign His Position. ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 4.—The whole structure of the autocratic regime is falling and Emperor Nicholas no longer resists. The memorable week, which witnessed the abdication of absolutism before a political strike demonstration extending throughout the confines of the empire and reducing the government to impotency, and the birth of a new and popular regime amid scenes of disorder, pillage, bloodshed and worse, ends in a complete surrender to the aspirations of the Finlanders. Diet Will Control Budget. On the advice of Count Witte and Prince John Obolensky Emperor Nicholas yielded and signed manifestos not only convokeing the Diet, but giving it control of the budget and authorizing an election law providing for universal suffrage. Another manifesto abrogates the military and other laws of Russia. These have been dispatched by fast torpedo boats to Helsinki, where they are due to arrive tonight. Dr. Turund, the leader of the Finnish deputation that waited on Emperor Nicholas, informed the Associated Press tonight that he expected the Finns would calm down and that the crisis would pass "as soon as the Helsinki people learn that the report that a republic was declared at St. Petersburg is untrue." The success of the Finnish program may inspire a similar movement in Poland for the restoration of ancient autonomy, but it will be more difficult for it to succeed here, as the Polish provinces have been deprived since the revolution of 1863 of all vestiges of administrative independence and merged into the general body of the empire. Warships Command City. HELSINKI, Nov. 4.—Batteries have been placed on two commanding hills outside the town, and the cannon in the Sveaborg fortress have been turned against the city, which also lies under the guns of the warships in the harbor. The authorities, with the assistance of 10,000 reinforcements which have arrived here, hope to be able to control the situation, though the insistence of the socialists on their impossible demands makes the position critical. Russian families are seeking shelter in the Nylands barracks. Prince John Obolensky, the governor general, covered his departure for St. Petersburg yesterday by artifice. He started out in the state carriage for the usual drive along the parade to the church, but did not return, slipping from the church to the quay, whence he rowed to the battleship Slovo and afterward was taken by a torpedo boat to St. Petersburg. RACIAL FIGHT IN VIENNA Germans Sing National Song and Order Others to Join in Its Honor. VIENNA, Nov. 4.—A racial demonstration took place here between students of the university, a few stones and sticks being used. Otherwise the day passed off without serious consequence. Wreck on the Wabash Road

Passenger Train Derailed Near Raymond, Ill., and Four Cars Are Overturned. ST. LOUIS, Nov. 4.—A Wabash passenger train coming to St. Louis was derailed while running at full speed near Raymond, Ill., this afternoon, several passengers being bruised, one an aged woman, severely. The train broke in two, the engine and two mail cars running a mile before being stopped, while the day coach, chair car, dining car and emigrant car left the rails and turned over. Almost miraculously no body was killed, but many were bruised. Traffic was delayed several hours.

Inspecting St. Louis Boats

Charges of Inefficiency Will Be Heard by Assistant Secretary Murray. WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—Lawrence O. Murray, assistant secretary of the Department of Commerce and Labor, and Herbert Knox Smith, deputy commissioner of corporations, will start for St. Louis tonight to take charge in the Fourth district of the recently ordered reinspection of the steamboat inspection service. The conditions at St. Louis are said to be serious. Jealousy between rival steamboat lines, it is charged, has resulted in racing of steamers on the Mississippi river and in alleged favoritism to certain lines in the matter of inspection. Messrs. Murray and Smith will arrive at St. Louis on November 5 and will conduct hearings, giving to all parties the opportunity to appear before them and produce evidence in relation to charges of inefficiency that have been made against inspection officers. Alleged Thief Bound Over. CANTON, O., Nov. 4.—Theodore Klinker, night watchman at the Canton postoffice, charged with extracting money from letters, contributing to the McKinley monument fund, has been held to appear for trial.
