

PAPA LOSES ANOTHER PAIR

Omaha Drops Two Games to Lincoln by the Score of 4 to 3.

LAST IS FAST TWELVE-INNING AFFAIR

Omaha Makes Two and Mickeyties Three Runs at the Finish—Rourke Loses Their Batting Eye.

Omaha lost both ends of a well-played double-header to Lincoln Sunday before a 4,000 people, the smallest Sunday crowd of the season, both games going by the same score, 4 to 3. Both games should have been won by Omaha, but they were not for the reason that Omaha made three or four errors in each game.

The first game looked as if it would be a cinch for Omaha when, with McNeely doing the tossing, Lincoln was blanked in the first inning and Omaha made three by hitting the ball. Everything was reversed in the second inning, however, for McNeely was hit for three safe ones, which, with Bassey's bad error, tied the score, and McKay tightened up and the Rourke family could do nothing with him during the remainder of the game.

Carter led off with a double and was sacrificed to third and Perring walked. Welch struck out and Bassey hit for a double, which scored Carter and Perring. Long's single brought Bassey home. Holmes Wagner started the second inning with singles and Barton sacrificed them for a base. Zinram hit to Bassey, who dropped the ball, allowing Ducky to score. Gagner came home on McKay's infield out, and Ketchum brought Zinram home with a double. That tied the score until the next inning, when Lincoln made three by winning run without a hit. Fenion walked on errors; Denver, J. Left on bases; Denver, J. Sacrifice hit; Randall, Donahue, Wilcox, Fenion, and Zinram.

The second game was a corker, with the result in doubt until the finish, which was a hair-raiser. Omaha made one run in the sixth inning and thus the score stood 1 to 0 until the ninth, when Dodge got wobbly and showed signs of ascending. Herman Long called in McNeely after the game was in a pinch, but the best Mac could do was to get the finish, which was Collins had been called in to bat for Zacker to do this and Pop Eyer had to pitch the game out. Neither side scored again until the twelfth inning, when Lincoln made three. After two were out for Omaha a batting rally was started, but the runs fell one short of 4 to tie the second game was gone.

Omaha made the first run in the sixth, when Carter walked and Howard was hit by a pitched ball. Perring flew out to Holmes and Carter hit into the third. He scored on grounder which took Perring for Barton to handle. A fast double kept Omaha from winning the game in the ninth inning after Lincoln had tied the score. Howard had led off on Pop Eyer with a single and was sacrificed to second by Perring. Welch hit safe, which put out Fenion on third with one out. Bassey hit to Fenion in deep right, and it looked as if Howard could beat the ball home, but a true throw did the business.

Gonding did some fast work in the third and fourth innings, when he nailed both Quillin and Holmes at third when double plays were undertaken. Quillin caught an ace of ending the game in the eleventh inning, but fast fielding by Dodge saved the run. Two were out, with Zinram on third, when Ketchum hit a hard grounder to Howard. Dodge covered the base, but the umpire called Ketchum safe. Dodge made a quick whirl and caught Zinram home.

The fireworks came in the twelfth and last inning, when Lincoln made three and Omaha came back with two. In the tenth inning Fenion had led off with a triple, but could get no farther. In the twelfth he again led off with a triple, which was caught in the end. He scored on the throw of Thomas out to Bassey. Collins singled, as did also Gagner and Barton, making three runs. In the Omaha half of the twelfth Perring and Welch were both retired by circus catches by Barton, when the bombardment started. Bassey hit safe and was followed by a clean single by Long. Gonding hit a high fly, which Ketchum dropped, and Dolan was called in to bat for Runkle. The old soldier made good with a single, bringing in the second run of the inning. It was then up to McNeely to win his own game. He hit the ball through the pitcher, but Gagner was playing close to second and called it, and Omaha had lost another double-header to Lincoln before a Sunday crowd.

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CARTER GOES TO MEMPHIS

Little Right Fielder is Held to Southern League Team.

ANXIOUS TO GET AWAY FROM OMAHA

Will Go When Rourke Gets the Money—Johnny Bender Will Be Home Soon to Help Out.

Bobby Carter has been sold to Memphis, in the Southern League, and will report there as soon as the money comes. Manager Babb has wired that he paid the price to Secretary Farrell and Rourke says he has not received the money, but will let Carter go as soon as he gets the money for him. Carter has been dicker with the Memphis team for some time and wanted to go there. The fact of his going to Memphis to play with such an extent that Manager Rourke says he thought it better to get the money for him and let him go.

Two new men are being negotiated for and one of these will be landed right away. Bender is again expected to return Friday and will not feel the loss of Carter as much as if these new players were not in sight and Bender was not to return. Holmes has a contract for Davidson, the fast Ft. Dodge player but he has been awarded to Sioux City by Secretary Farrell for a new right fielder for this player.

The signing of Carter leaves but two of the old guard on the Omaha team, Gonding and Dolan; that is two of the men who were here when Carter came. Welch joined up as a regular soon after Carter was picked up by President Rourke in 1901 from Bloomington and in the three-1 League, Bobby having come up from the south. But Rourke farmed him out to Terre Haute and brought him back to Omaha in 1902, since when he has been playing right field continuously.

Has Been a Favorite. Carter became a favorite with the fans soon after joining the team and has maintained that relationship, although his lapse in batting and base running this year has served to dampen the ardor of some of his oldtime admirers. For a time he was regarded as the premier base runner in the league; he has always been a good, faithful fielder and has batted better than he has just now. His decided slump is attributed somewhat to his earnest desire to go south, the land of his nativity. He sustained an accident to his knee some months ago which has made it hard for him to keep up his fastest pace.

Robert admits being 29 years of age and is expected to make good for several seasons to come, if he stays in base ball. A few weeks ago President Rourke, in Carter's presence, remarked to a mutual friend that Bobby wanted to leave Omaha and Bobby interjected the remark that he thought of quitting the game, but his friends are not looking for his retirement soon. Carter will meet his old teammate, Liebhaber, on the Memphis team, but the chances are they won't play on the same club long, for Liebhaber has made such a record of hitting as to call for half a dozen big league teams and will go up higher next season. But then Eddie Quick probable will stick in Little Rock for a while longer.
