BUCKINGHAM WILL GET IT

Slated for General Manager Union Stock Yards Monday.

J. I. FAXTON SEVERS CONNECTION

General Manderon Will Retire as President and Lee Spratlan May Accept Position When Directors Meet.

Everett Buckingham, according to the unequivocal statement of a director, will be elected general manager of the Union Stock Yards company of South Omaha when the board of directors meet Monday. James L. Faxton, superintendent, who has been acting as general manager since the resignation some time ago of W. J. C. Kenyon, has resigned and severed all connection with the company. The position of superintendent will be abolished. Every office from president down will be filled by the board. General C. F. Manderon, who was elected as president, will take a similar place with the Oregon Short Line at Salt Lake City and resigned that position some weeks ago, his resignation becoming effective December 15.

Faxton Goes to Private Business. "I expect to devote my time to my private business in Omaha," said James L. Faxton, "if that time interests have been demanding more and more attention. I do not know who will be chosen as president of the Union Stock Yards company, nor who will be made general manager. The affairs at present will demand numerous changes and perhaps the chief officials will all be changed. I would not venture a prediction. Many rumors have been about, but it is better not to say anything at all."

Commitment men are keenly alive to the importance of having good material at the disposal of the Union Stock Yards company. The election of Mr. Faxton and the subsequent resignations have been sources of regret among the members of the exchange. That of W. Scott King is also included among the number of important resignations. The general meeting of the stockholders will have a big task on hand. This makes the annual meeting Monday one of the great events in the history of the South Omaha market.

Mr. Kenyon, it will be remembered, went to Chicago to assume the position of general manager of the Chicago subway system. W. Scott King identified himself with the National Construction company after he had tendered his resignation. He was persuaded to retain his position with the Union Stock Yards company until after the annual meeting.

DEMOCRATS ARE LOOKING UP

South Dakota Minority Party Will Have Many Candidates for Place.

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Dec. 7.—(Special.)—The democrats of South Dakota, who have never been able to do very much in the way of capturing offices so far as state positions are concerned, are beginning to "sit up" and take notice in view of the fact that the insurgent or progressive and stalwart republican factions of South Dakota have grappled each other by the throat, figuratively speaking, and will next year fight the hottest battle in the history of the state for control of state affairs. With the object of outlining their course during the political campaign of next year, Harry Wentz, of Pukwana, chairman of the democratic state central committee, has called a meeting of the state committee, which will be held in Sioux Falls on December 12.

SUIT OVER MCKINLEY WILL

Administrator of Estate of A. McKinley Asks Court to Construct Two Classes.

CANTON, O., Dec. 7.—Secretary of the Treasury Cortelyou and Justice William R. Day are made party defendants to an action in common pleas court against the heirs and administrators of the estate of William McKinley. Secretary Cortelyou and Justice Day as the administrators of the McKinley estate have the possession for distribution of \$250,000. The court action is brought by Robert S. Shields, administrator of the estate of Abner McKinley a brother of William McKinley, to get a decree setting forth the meaning of a part of William McKinley's will. Shields declares he requested the administrators of the late William McKinley's estate to have the court interpret the will when he considers it doubtful but they refused to do so. He recites that he is in doubt as to whether the annuity given to "Mother" McKinley by the will of William McKinley expires at her death. The doubtful clause in the will is: "To pay My Mother during life \$100,000 and at her death said sum to be paid to my sister Helen McKinley."

EUROPE'S ROYAL NURSERIES

Children in Fourteen Out of Eighteen Courts.

NATIONS OF ROYAL YOUNGSTERS

Little Prince of Norway Stands Up for His Parents' Rights—Infante of Spain Grants a Petition.

Certainly in fourteen and probably in fifteen of the eighteen empires and kingdoms of Europe there are families of young children who are ready to bring royal direct or presumptive to the throne. In a few cases they are children of the sovereign; often they are grandchildren or nephews. In the case of Sweden there is a great grandson.

The most pathetic of the childless courts is that of Holland. In Austria and Portugal the ultimate living heirs are young men still unmarried. The doubtful case is Turkey. The "Almanach de Gotha" gives no particulars as to the domestic status of Selim Zeffendi, the sultan's eldest son. But he is 27, and it is highly probable that he is childless.

As a rule efforts are made to bring royal children up simply and modestly and to shield their nursery life from the public gaze, but it is inevitable that a great many details leak out. One little prince who has been very much before the public in his brief life of four years is Olaf, crown prince of Norway. When he visited his grandfather in England a few months ago with his father and mother he attracted almost as much notice as King Haakon and Queen Maud.

He is said to be a very self-willed young gentleman, with a large sized idea of his own and his parents' rights. The last story told of him represented him as stepping his foot when little playmate climbed into a big armchair in one of the private salons in the palace at Christiania.

Holding it in his hand he made his way through the corridors of the Escurial, the secretary and a few other attendants tagging on behind him. In the nursery they called the queen and the baby prince sitting up in his crib.

"The king—explained the situation and then with a formal bow returned the letter to the secretary.

"But what shall I do with it, sire?" the latter asked.

"Why give it to the prince, to whom it is directed, of course."

The secretary with his best obedience laid it on the royal cradle. The baby grabbed at it and smiled.

"Well, what does the prince say to it?" asked the king after a pause, turning to the nurse.

"Really, your majesty, he appears to me to say nothing," was the matter of fact reply.

"All right, silence gives consent," said the king. "Mr. Secretary, see that the letter is forwarded to the War department with the proper endorsement and write to the woman that the prince grants her request."

The Russian Imperial children lead a beautiful outdoor life, for the most part at Tsarsko-Selo, always with a powerful guard of soldiers and secret service agents beyond the range of vision. It is a wonder that the poor little grand duke, who is the heir to the dignity of czar, is not already overwhelmed by his title.

He is now just 2 years and 3 months old and he is Hetman of all the Cossacks, Chief of the Regiment of the Guard of Finland, Colonel of the Fifty-first Regiment of Infantry of Klovsk, of the Twelfth Regiment of Infantry of Eastern Siberia, of the Corps of Cadets of Tashkend, Captain of the Fourth Battery of Horse Artillery of the Guard, Commandant of the Military School at Moscow, of the Forty-fourth Regiment of Dragoons of the Ural-Novgorod and of the Forty-fifth Regiment of Dragoons of Sevsk. He is also a Chevalier of the Order of St. Andrew.

Notwithstanding these dignities it is said that his greatest joy in life is a red and blue Punchinello and that he occasionally scribbles with his rumber sister, Princess Anastasia, who is 5 years old, for possession of it.

Sometimes odd things happen to royal children. Not long ago, as the cable told the readers of The Bee, the carriage in which the youngest daughter of Kaiser Wilhelm was driving with her governess in the outskirts of Berlin ran over a little boy.

The princess, who is 15 jumped out and ran after the crowd that was carrying the little chap to a drug store near by. Then a vigilant policeman who formed the idea that she was trying to escape dashed after her and caught her by the arm.

"You must come with me to the police station," he growled. "And first of all, what is your name and who are your parents?"

"My name is Victoria Louise," replied the little girl, with a fine air of offended dignity, "and my father is the Kaiser."
