Fire Loss Big in Last Year. "Omaha has had a greater fire loss in he last twelve months than is generally magined," said Jay D. Foster of the H. E. Palmer Insurance company. "There was \$22,000 paid out last April for the Fry Shoe ompany fire; the Haney fire cost insurance companies \$18,000; the Omaha Packing company collected \$50,000 and Cudahy \$130. 000 for the big South Omaha fire; on building and stock for the Nebraska-Moline Plow ompany there was paid out \$58,000 and at least \$10,000 for this fire of Thursday. That is nearly \$300,000 in insurance paid out and losses aside from this might be roughly estimated at \$100,000 more, or a total of \$400,000 burnt up. There was no one over-
