ENLARGE OMAHA UNIVERSITY

New Science Hall Will Be Erected During School Year.

FINANCIAL PROSPECTS BRIGHT

Rapid Growth of Institution Demands an Extension of Its Capacities—Twenty-Six Registered for Fall Term.

On the beautiful campus of Omaha university, located at Twenty-fourth and Pratt streets, a new building is to be erected during the present school year to be known as Science hall. This announcement was made today by Dr. H. H. Maynard, vice president of the university. With the favorable outlook for the growth of the new institution and the assurance of financial support, it is deemed necessary to enlarge the capacity of the school. With the purchase of over twenty-two acres of valuable land in one of the most desirable sections of the city the backers of the university were looking only to the future and expansion with age. Twenty-six students were registered in the university for the fall term. This is considered a remarkably good registration and the directors expect a much larger number of students next year, with the increased possibilities and better equipment. Omaha university is an undenominational Protestant institution. It is supported solely by contribution. Teaching is given in advanced work of college character beyond the lines taught in high and preparatory schools.

ELKS ENTERTAIN FRIENDS

Army Officers and Dockstader's Minstrels Among Honor Guests.
MEET GRAND EXALTED RULER
Interesting Program of Addresses, Music and Much Fun Services to Make a Most Pleasant Evening.
Half a hundred regular army officers, Lew Dockstader's minstrel troupe, Grand Exalted Ruler J. U. Sammis of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, the Sixteenth Infantry military band, Dimick's carnival musicians and members of local lodge No. 39, together with visiting members of the Elks' order, form a combination that is hard to equal, when it comes to real mirth and enjoyment.
The Elks' headquarters fairly rocked with martial music, inspiring address and side-splitting merriment last evening. Members of the local lodge had planned the entertainment in honor of the army officers present in the city for the Ak-Sar-Ben festival and their exalted ruler, J. U. Sammis of Sioux City, Ia., the biggest man today in Elkdom.
In the way of entertainment matters took their own course. The Sixteenth Infantry band was present in the city for the great military parade and Dimick's carnival musicians were Johnny on the spot after their regular session at the palace of Ak-Sar-Ben. Then came Lew Dockstader, the minstrel, and himself a loyal and true member of the initial lodge in the country.
