NEW ELECTION AMENDMENT

Biennial Law Will Not Be in Full Force Until 1915.

PLAN FOR UNIVERSITY REVENUE

University Alumni Will Back Move Next Saturday for Steady Revenue for Support of Institution.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 11.—(Special.)—The constitutional amendment for biennial elections, ratified by the voters of the state last Tuesday, will not become operative to abolish of year elections until 1915. A chief justice of the supreme court, two university regents and county officials will be chosen in 1915 as usual.

However, the officials elected in November, 1912, will not take their offices until January, 1913, as the amendment adopted adds one year to the terms of the officials, who were to go out of office in January, 1914.

After 1914 elections will come only on the even numbered years, and the supreme court judges, regents of the university and county officials, will be chosen simultaneously with president every four years and with governor, and state officers every two years.

It is understood that the effort is being made to take the revenue source of the university out of politics and to divorce the campus from the legislature as much as possible. This plan is said to have been tried out in Michigan and Wisconsin. A committee has spent considerable time working on the Nebraska plan, which will be made public at the coming banquet.

Stall Prison Report. Work was commenced Monday on the biennial report of the Nebraska state penitentiary officials to the legislature. The report will embrace the work of the prison during the years 1911 and 1912, and will be ready for distribution among the legislators when they assemble here early in January. The report will appear in book form, with illustrations of the prison.

Mr. Ferguson's Vote. J. L. Ferguson of Broken Bow, defeated candidate by petition for the United States senate at the election last Tuesday, feels that he has been slighted by the newspapers, who have not mentioned his name widely in the publication of the returns.

In a letter to Secretary of State Wait received here today he says: Dear Sir: As yet I have failed to see how many votes I received at the recent election for United States senator. Will kindly inform me, and also why my name does not appear with the other candidates, and oblige. J. L. FERGUSON.

Official returns from fifty counties received so far indicate that they gave Mr. Ferguson a total vote of 228.

Workmen's Compensation. The Nebraska workmen's compensation law commission is at work here on the preliminary draft of the bill, which will probably be submitted to the legislature when it convenes in Lincoln early next month.

Members of the commission stated today that no part of the deliberations of the commission will be made public until it is ready to report to the legislature.

Object to Number Thirteen. Members of the new legislature of the state of Nebraska have a fine respect for hoodony. So far all of the state senators and representatives have refused to take seat No. 13 or seat No. 23.

A friend of Senator-elect Jacob Klein of Beatrice today selected seat No. 13 for him, but later Mr. Klein sent word that he could not take No. 13.

Take Up Fair Rates. Secretary W. H. Mellor of the Nebraska State Agricultural Board and Secretary H. L. Cook of the Kansas Board, and representatives of other western state fair associations are at Chicago attending a meeting of the Western Passenger association in regard to securing special fair rates next year.

No low rates were granted for the exhibitions this year, while in former years tickets have been sold on a basis of return trips for 15 cents per mile. The railroads have consistently clung to the argument that with the passenger tariffs reduced to 2 cents a mile they cannot afford to make an additional cut.

LINCOLN WOMAN MARRIES E. W. CLARK IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—Mrs. Rhoda Hawley Stewart, 46, who divorced Lou L. Stewart in Lincoln, Neb., in 1896, and Edward William Clark, 44, whose home is in Rome, Italy, and who, according to his license application, is a teacher, are enjoying a honeymoon today.

According to the officials of the marriage license bureau, Rev. H. H. Harmon of Lincoln called there Saturday and asked them to issue a license after hours. He said he had accompanied Mrs. Stewart from Lincoln and that Clark was on a steamer, which would not get in until Saturday night. Where the ceremony took place is not known.

Mrs. Stewart was formerly a state house employe at Lincoln and her divorced husband now resides in Omaha.

UNOFFICIAL RECOUNT SETTLE TIE VOTE IN HALL COUNTY

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., Nov. 11.—(Special Telegram.)—The tie vote between Slusser, republican and O'Malley, democrat, as one of the two representatives from this county, by written agreement will be settled by the canvassing boards finding without changing the official count, or contesting, simply being settled by recounting all the ballots. There is some dispute as to the legality of the procedure. The county attorney refused to file with the clerk a written opinion, but advised the canvassers to go ahead with five of the twenty-one precincts yet to recount. O'Malley's lead over the official returns by the election boards is eleven votes. It is believed numerous errors were made in not counting all of the straight socialist votes that properly went to O'Malley.

ASHLAND SCHOOL TEACHER IS DEAD OF PNEUMONIA

ASHLAND, Neb., Nov. 11.—(Special Telegram.)—After an illness of over two weeks with pneumonia, Miss Attye G. Wagner died yesterday at the home of Horace H. Wilson in this city, aged 23 years. Miss Wagner was serving her third year as a second grade teacher in the Ashland schools and was very popular with her associates. A short service was held at the Wilson home this afternoon, conducted by Rev. Joseph Tompa, pastor of the Congregational church, and the body was taken tonight to her late home at Grafton for interment. Miss Wagner was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Wagner of Grafton.

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MORE COUNTY RETURNS IN

Additional Figures Show no Changes in Relative Standing.

MOREHEAD GAINS SLOWLY

His Plurality Over Aldrich Will Be About Twelve Thousand—All Republican Candidates Below Governor Have Good Pluralities.

Additional election returns, official and unofficial, from eighty-four counties on governor and United States senator, seventy-eight counties on president and sixty-nine counties on the state ticket reveal no changes in the relative standing of the candidates. The plurality of Moorhead over Aldrich will be about 12,000. The pluralities of republican candidates below the office of governor will average nearly 10,000. Wilson's plurality will be nearly 30,000. The figures follow:

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—(Special Telegram.)—Sixty thousand dollars is what Patrick Carragher, 33 years old, 1022 North Dearborn avenue, formerly a Nebraska farmer, says he was parted from in eight months' business experience in Chicago.

"Now I shall return to Nebraska and endeavor to make up my lost fortune," he told Desk Sergeant Dooley at East Chicago avenue police station when released.

He was taken into custody by a policeman who found him in a helpless condition, lying on a sidewalk. He was in the saloon business and says his partner swindled him. The partner is at present under indictment by the grand jury.

ROMANCE OF LINCOLN GIRL ENDS IN POLICE COURT

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—Poverty coming upon her when her husband went to Europe to aid Greece in the Turkish war, drove Mrs. Ella Beauchamp Poppas to the theft of money from a store here today, but her love of her husband's patriotism were not sufficient to overcome the prosecutor's determination to have her punished and she was held in bonds of \$300 for trial. Mrs. Poppas was a pupil in a high school at Lincoln, Neb., and eloped with her husband, who was a waiter in the restaurant where she took her meals.

Old Mansion Burned at Kearney.

KEARNEY, Neb., Nov. 11.—(Special.)—The old L. D. Grant residence property built in 1871, went up in smoke Saturday night, the origin of the fire being unknown, as the family occupying it was downtown at the time the alarm was turned in. The old mansion stood on Capitol hill, which was hoisted at the last session of the legislature as a site for the capitol building if the removal from Lincoln could be effected.

Andrew Fase, Sarpy Pioneer Passes Away

PAPILLION, Neb., Nov. 11.—(Special.)—Andrew Fase, a pioneer of Sarpy county, died at his home in Papillion this morning from causes due to old advanced age. He was born in Runstead, Braunschweig, Germany, June 27, 1832, and came to America in 1854. He settled first in Ohio, where he was married to Miss Sophia Tmmel, also a native of Germany. In 1882 they came to Nebraska, making the trip most of the way by boat. He bought a farm where Papillion is now located, and made his home there for many years. About twenty-two years ago he retired from active business and moved to Papillion.

Mr. Fase was a respected and industrious citizen and had accumulated considerable wealth. Several years ago he gave each of his children an eighty-acre farm worth \$50 per acre, reserving a small income for himself and wife. On September 4 last they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary, when all his children and grandchildren met at the old home. At that time Mr. and Mrs. Fase both appeared to be hale and hearty for their years.

He leaves surviving him his aged widow, three sons, Henry Fase of Hignaville, Mo.; Edward and Dave Fase of Papillion, and one daughter, Mrs. Tillie Clarke of Papillion. The funeral will be held Wednesday at 1 o'clock from the German Methodist church, of which he was a member.
