GAMBLING IN THIRD WARD

Man Held for Highway Robbery So Testifies in Police Court.

TELLS OF SEVERAL PLACES

Police Judge Foster Says that He is Powerless to Close Up the Places, Though No Doubt They are Running.

Gambling houses, saloons and houses of ill repute are allowed to run wide open in the Third ward all night in violation of the law, according to the testimony of Henry Bentley, colored, in police court yesterday, while being tried on a highway robbery charge.

The Midway, a colored "joint" operated by Jack Broomfield, is open at all hours of the day and night, he stated, and there is always a big crap game open to the general public going on all the time. Beer and whisky can be purchased there by the glass or bottle any time during the night, he said, there being no attempt to keep the sale secret.

"I can't close up these joints," Police Magistrate Charles E. Foster said. "If the police refuse or are unable to do their duty it is not my fault. No doubt these places are running full tilt, but it is up to the police to look after these affairs."

Tells of Clubs.

Bentley also told of another place known as the Jones club, where liquor can be purchased and money lost in gambling games. He did not quite remember the address, but thought it was on Douglas street about two blocks west of the police station.

Bentley was arrested for robbing Joe Baxter and Dick Barker, two Mondamin, Ia., farmers, on the Douglas street bridge last Sunday morning. He was bound over to the district court under \$1,000 bonds.

He told of making the rounds of these places Saturday night with the two Iowa farmers and participating in the crap games and buying beer and whisky. The Big Four saloon was visited, he said, and beer purchased.

Some months ago the proprietors of the Midway—Jack Broomfield and Billy Crutchfield—were tried six times in police court for violation of the 5 o'clock closing law. Each time the jury disagreed. The defendants were discharged in district court.

Essay Writers for Prizes Are Divided for Competition

Prizes for essays in the school students' Know Omaha contest have been divided to cover five winners in each class of the competition. Children in the various grades of South Omaha, Benson, Florence and Dundee public and parochial schools will compete with children in the same grades in Omaha schools. Pupils of the first, second, third, fourth and fifth grades will compete for the \$15, \$10, \$5, \$3 and \$2 prizes with essays of not more than 600 words. The high school students are divided into ninth and tenth grades and eleventh and twelfth grades to compete for \$20, \$15, \$10 and \$5 prizes with essays of not more than 1,000 words.

Students of Creighton university, Bellevue college and the University of Omaha, who are above the preparatory course will write 1,500 word essays for prizes of \$25, \$20 and \$15.

The essays will be turned into the committee May 3 and the prizes will be awarded on Know Omaha day, May 25.
